OREGON STATE NEWS OF GENERAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

Continued warm weather and luck with the snowplow will result in the opening of McKenzie pass within a week or ten days.

Twenty-three Klamath wool growers sold 400,000 pounds of wool to the J. Koshland company of Boston at a price of 30 cents a pound.

More than 2000 persons who have lived in Oregon for 40 or more years attended the annual pioneers' picnic at the state fair grounds in Salem Sunday.

Ida Powell, dean of women at Albany college, was elected president of the Albany Business and Professional Women's club.

Dr. Rinehart of Wheeler has received a shipment of two dozen large eastern bullfrogs, several of which weigh two pounds each. They have been released in Lake Neah-kah-nie.

Petitions bearing 714 signatures and demanding the recall of S. G. Reed of Nehalem, Tillamook county commissioner, were filed with the county clerk. The election will be held June 28.

With four councilmen in favor of the action and Mayor Saxon opposing the council at its regular meeting ousted Ward A. Colby, for the past several months deputy marshal of St. Helens.

Robert S. Eakin of La Grande was elected grand master of the grand lodge of Oregon, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, by the grand lodge in session at the new Portland Masonic temple.

Tuition fee of \$100 will be charged all non-residents, including Filipinos who attend the Salem senior high school, according to a decision reached at a meeting of the directors of the Salem district.

The capital stock of the First National bank of Tillamook has been increased from \$50,000 to \$100,000, giving the bank a combined capital and surplus of \$150,000, and total resources of nearly \$2,000,000.

Portland's \$1,250,000 new Masonic temple, West Park and Main streets, was officially dedicated before an audience which filled the large assembly hall on the first floor of the structure to overflowing.

Rainier has won its right to entertain the 1928 session of the state grange when in a spirited contest with Oregon City and Bend it polled a clear majority of 34 votes over its two rivals on the first ballot.

FARM MARKET REVIEW

Brief Summary of Commodity Trends June 20, 1927

WOOL: The Boston market was more active last week, with some advance in asking prices on domestic wool on increasing inquiry from mill operators. No particular change was noted in the mohair situation.

LIVESTOCK: Heavy beef steers advanced again last week in eastern markets to new high level for the season and all other classes except bulls were in strong demand on light receipts. Western markets were steady but anticipating more grass cattle. Hogs took a slight upturn in eastern markets when receipts fell off. More half-fat and grassy pork is arriving. Portland was steady but San Francisco weak on hogs. Lamb markets weakened material in the east but held nearly steady on the coast.

BUTTER: Score 92 brought 42 to 43 cents at San Francisco and was in good demand. Poor grades went slow. Eastern butter markets were unsettled but there was no decline in prices. "Centralized" stocks moved very slowly. The shortage of cold storage butter compared to last year has about been wiped out. Production is running above last year and conditions are still good in leading dairy sections.

WHEAT: The market weakened slightly with good weather for spring

wheat and increasing receipts of new crop winter wheat. Pacific coast markets were fairly steady with No. 1 hard quoted at \$1.41 in San Francisco and milling wheat at Los Angeles \$1.44 to \$1.53 a bushel.

FEED GRAINS: Maltine grades advanced 15-25 cents a hundred pounds at San Francisco and European markets continued firm although reports indicate good crops of barley in foreign producing districts. Feed barley markets in the east declined on heavier receipts but corn advanced on light receipts and continued unfavorable growing conditions for a new crop.
