Waited Until 70 to Start Career But Carved Success in Four Short Years

"She's president of the company and general manager of the factory," they told me in New Haven, Conn., her home town, "and she was nearly 70 before she even thought of doing such a thing. She came back from a trip around the world to find the business her husband had built up just about done for in the after-the-war slump. She jumped into things and worked night and day to get that factory back on its feet. It's there now and growing."

"That sounds like a man-sized job," I said. "It is that, and she didn't have to do it, for she has plenty of her own. But a good many of us that had stock in the company would have lost it if she hadn't come to the rescue."

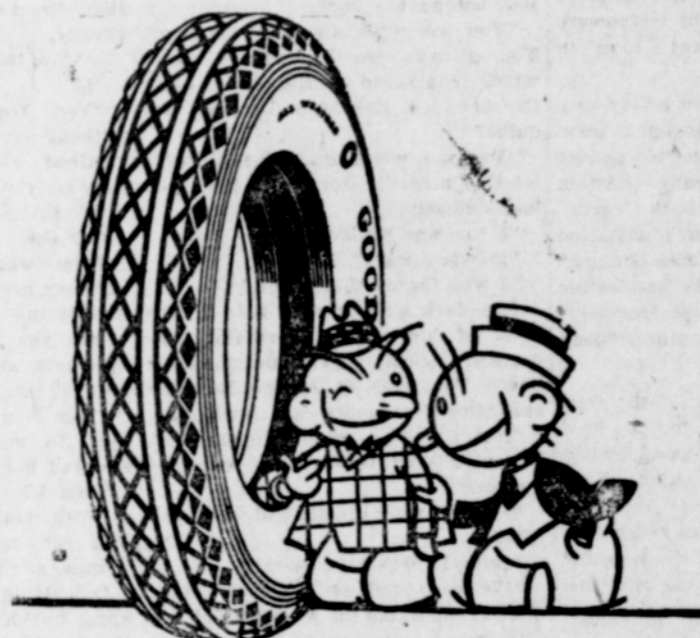
