

**MANY SETTLERS COMING TO OREGON LANDS**

Portland—Aug. 18—(Special)—The first fifteen days of August have registered twenty-five new settlers on the records of the Land Settlement Department of the Portland and State Chambers of Commerce. These recent newcomers, according to the real estate men and local committees, have invested over \$82,000 in the lands which they have purchased since coming to Oregon from other states.

Interest in Oregon lands continues active with daily arrivals in the state of farmers who have been in correspondence with the Department. In addition to the letters being received from those who have been in touch with the department for as long as two and three years, a steady stream of new inquiries call for information and literature about Oregon farm opportunities. During the first half of August 577 letters have been received by the Department. Many of these come as direct result of railroad advertising while a large number are sent by those whose friends and former neighbors have already availed themselves of the services of the land settlement organization and settled in Oregon.

Signed questionnaires have been furnished by 46 inquirers since the first of August, of whom 36 stated definitely that they were making arrangements to come to Oregon. They anticipate making investments here which will approximate \$74,000. A close check is kept on the records of those who thus designate their intention to come to Oregon and follow up letters are sent to them from time to time. In this way it has been ascertained that a very large percentage of those using the department's service in obtaining information take advantage of the opportunities offered and establish themselves in the state, usually within a year after their decision to come.

In answering new inquiries and furnishing information to those who contemplate coming to Oregon as farm settlers, the Land Settlement Department sent out 2026 letters during the first two weeks of August, with 473 packages of illustrated literature describing agriculture in Oregon.

**Pears Selling Well.**

Cannery men and warehouse men started some rivalry in the buying of pears in the Yakima section in Washington recently, with the result that a large quantity was purchased on a basis of \$60 and \$65 a ton.

**Profitable Berries**

A 7-acre tract of strawberries at Hood River yielded 1900 crates of packed berries and 700 crates of berries for cannery purposes, says Portland Journal. The revenue from the seven acres exceeds \$7,000. The berries were Clark seedlings.

**WHEN TO BEGIN GETTING READY FOR SCHOOL**

As soon as a child begins to walk the first steps should be taken to prepare him for the hazards of going to school. The age period between two and seven years is one of tremendous importance when the child's future health and happiness are to be considered. This age has been sadly neglected in the past, and vital statistics show that one-third of all deaths occur under the age of six years. These years determine the child's future prospects such as the foundation and frame determine the structure. The law of growth makes these the most formative of all years. Much care is given to the baby, but the mother too frequently forgets that the runabout child is probably in need of greater attention than the nursing baby. The child is left too much to his own desires. No greater mistake could be made because this is the most important period in the child's life.

Parents must remember that they are accountable and responsible for the normal development of their chil-

dren. Children should be carefully prepared for school life. The preschool period is in need of expert advice. This is the period when an intelligent and scientific examination can do much to safeguard its future health. An expert will be able to detect defects in their first stage. A correction of these defects may make success out of a child that was doomed to failure and chronic suffering.

School teachers find that children are handicapped because they have been neglected at home. The parent has failed to realize that the age from two to six should be one of preparation. In these years habits of right thinking and living must be formed. The child's physical progress should be followed by regular examinations of at least height, weight, and mental development. When physical defects are found they should be remedied.

The preschool child should have well regulated hours of play, rest, sleep, and meals. Health habits, such as bathing frequently; cleaning of teeth; outdoor living; liberal use of fruits and whole grain vegetables and drinking plenty of water are necessary to insure his future life and prosperity.—State Board of Health.
