NEW DEAN OF MEN COMES TO UNIVERSITY

University of Oregon, Eugene, Sept 15 (Special)—Elmer L. Shirrell, newly elected dean of men, has taken over his duties at the University of Oregon, and already is making preparations to assist in directing the work of new students during "Freshman Week" which opens here September 19. Mr. Shirrell will address the students at the opening assembly September 29 and will serve as advisor for registration and other problems that may arise.

Mr. Shirrell, who comes here after completing residence work for a degree of doctor of philosophy at Stanford University, has extensive training and experience that fits him for the place at Oregon. Just before taking up his work in Stanford last February, he had served for two years as dean of men at the University of Arizona, and while there also taught two courses in Political Science.

From 1919 to 1924 Mr. Shirrell was head of the United States Veteran bureau for the Twelfth district, which is composed of the states of California, Arizona and Nevada. This work took him into contact with all classes of men in educational fields.

During the war Mr. Shirrell served as a sergeant in 364th infantry of the 91st division, and saw considerable service overseas. He was in several engagements, and was one of the three sergeants out of 15 in his group who survived. Of this 15, eight were killed, and four others were severely wounded. Just before embarking for Europe Mr. Shirrell refused an opportunity for a commission in order to remain with his company which had been promised service in France. His experience as an enlisted man, particularly since he saw considerable action, has been extremely valuable, especially in his work with the veteran's bureau, he declares, and he has never regretted his decision not to accept a commission that would have meant remaining in the United States during the war.

The new dean holds a master of arts and a bachelor of arts degree from the University of California. He is a member of Phi Delta Kappa, education fraternity. He is also a member of the American Legion, and the Masonic lodge.

Mr. Shirrell is taking the place of Dean H. Walker, who is now on leave of absence to study at Columbia University.
