INFANTILE PARALYSIS HAS SECOND VICTIM IN SPRINGFIELD, REPORT

A second case of infantile paralysis was reported here today, when Lorraine, 5-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Pedicord, was placed under quarantine.

The little girl fell and was injured on Sunday. On Monday morning she was taken sick, although paralysis did not develop until Wednesday. One leg is paralyzed today. Paralysis took place after serum was administered by a local physician.

The other case is that of the three-year old daughter of Robert Kizer. She has been ill for a week, and is reported to be slightly improved at present.

Dr. W. H. Pollard, city health officer, made an inspection of local school buildings yesterday for the purpose of determining their sanitary condition. In general, he said, the school premises are in good shape, although he will recommend some

changes to the board of education. Mud, of the sticky Oregon variety, makes it almost impossible to keep the buildings clean at the present time, Dr. Pollard said. This is a condition existing almost everywhere, he said.

John King in Hospital

Taken violently ill this morning, John King, attache in the Booth-Kelly Lumber company offices here, was rushed to the Eugene hospital by Dr. W. H. Pollard. The exact nature of Mr. King's illness was not determined late this morning, and his condition remained virtually unchanged.

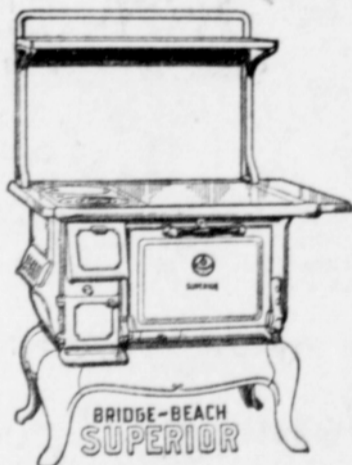
