County Home Demonstration Work Reported For Period

September 1 to December 1

CLOTHING PROJECT

Clothing Renovation: Twentynine meetings were held in 12 different communities on clothing renovation. Work in renovation of silk and woolen materials, alteration of commercial patterns, tailored finishes and practical suggestions on choice of style and color for the individual are included in this series of meetings. A series of three meetings for each community is generally necessary to complete the work, these meetings are scheduled in three successive weeks on a day convenient for the women of the community and the agent. A total of 120 makeover dresses were completed at an average cost of \$1.08 per dress, and 37 dresses were planned at the meetings to be completed at home. Fourteen coats were constructed of used materials-three of which were women's coats, the remaining children's

bers cooperating in the construction. The material is purchased from the demonstration agent at a considerable

3. Millinery: One class in fall millinery was held, with a large attendence record. Twenty-one hats were completed at an average cost of \$.40 realizing a saving of \$2.70 per hat. Used materials were renovated and made up into acceptable models, felt materials were also used with success: soft draped hats were the general style selected. In addition work on renovation of hat materials, points on selection of suitable hats for the individual were given by the agent. NUTRITION

Two communities were given the work in nutrition, comprising a study of foods and their relation to health, formation of correct health habits in children and balanced meal planning. A representative luncheon was prepared at each meeting and served by _ those attending. Each member was weighed and condition checked for normalcy; individual problems in diet
