Proper pruning is one of the moseffective means of increasing the size and sugar contents of the Italian Prune, the production committee of the Northwest Dried Prune Convention declared in making its report at the Corvallis meeting last June. The committee added that pruning materially aids in reducing fluctuations in yields and variations in sizes, as well as in maintaining vigor of the trees Other advantages claimed are easier control of brown rot and a decrease in the number of red prunes ordinarily produced.
