GRAY DIGGER WAR TO START IN COUNTY

The 1928 campaign against gray digger ground squirrels is getting well under way in all parts of Lane county, according to O. S. Fletcher, county agent. The county agent has prepared more than two tons of poison barley and has established agencies in all parts of the county. The poison barley is put up in five-pound bags and sell at fifty cents each.

Following is a list of places in this part of the county where poison barley can be purchased: Springfield, Gray's Cash Store; Waltherville, Sylvester's store; Mar-

cola, Walter Price store; Fall Creek, R. C. Brewer, store; Lowell, F. E. Blair store; Dexter, Wm. Williams' store; Trent, J. R. Woods' store; Eugene: Oregon Seed and Feed company; Brogdon Feed and Seed Store; Farmers Union Warehouse Company, and the County Agent's office.

The state rodent control law requiring all persons having charge of land to poison ground squirrels on their holdings will be enforced in Lane county again this year, according to the county agent. Official notice in regard to this matter will be found in another column of this paper. The county agent states that under this law squirrels on 10,618 acres in forty tracts neglected by the owners were poisoned at the expense of the owners in 1927, and the expenses charged against the land and collected with the taxes. Land owners are advised to see to it that tenants poison squirrels on their land.

Farm organizations and community committees in all parts of the county are cooperating with the county agent in the squirrel control campaign and rodent control supervisors will be appointed in all school districts where squirrel control is a problem.
