

SAFETY ZONES TO BE AT BUS STOPS

Council Creates Non-Parking Strips That Bus May Come to Curb for Passengers; Smitson Would Resign as Chief of Police.

Thirty five feet safety zones for bus stops will be established on Main street and at Fifth and Main corner according to agreement of the council at its Monday night meeting.

No parking will be allowed in the safety zones and the street buses will be required to pull up to the curb before taking on or discharging passengers.

Chief of Police Would Quit Smitson submitted his resignation to the council to take effect April 1 but the request was tabled.

A new schedule of electrical wiring and plumbing permit and inspection fees was considered by the council.

Ordinances covering the permits and street safety zones will be submitted at the next meeting.

NEW BOOKS ADDED TO SPRINGFIELD LIBRARY

One hundred sixty-four new books were added to the Springfield library during the year 1927, according to the yearly report, which has just been issued by Miss Mary Roberts, librarian.

A total of 2160 books are owned by the library, and 2160 were taken out during the year. The largest daily circulation was 204 books, and the smallest, 21. A total of 200 books were borrowed from the state library during the year.

BONDS FOR SCHOOL TO BE RE-ISSUED

Resale Will Make Rate of Interest Lower; \$9000 of Old Issue Remains; First Payment Will Fall Due in 1931, on Other Bond Issues

Bonds for \$11,000 are being offered for sale by school district 19. This will refund bonds issued in 1910 to finance the building of the Lincoln school.

The board has decided to refund the bonds at this time because it was found that the rate of interest might be made more advantageous. The original issue is drawing five percent interest, while the new issue will draw only four and one half percent.

After refunding the present issue, there will be no bonds to be met by the school district until 1931, when there will be \$1000 due each year until 1934.

PLANS FOR NEW BRIDGE PREPARED

Bids to Be Opened March 27; Work Must Be Completed by February 1, 1929; Bridge Will Be At End of Main Street, to Have Three Spans.

Specifications for the Springfield bridge, which were recently completed, and are now at the office of Judge C. P. Barnard, show a three span bridge, with a 150 foot pier approach at either end.

The Springfield approach will enter Main street diagonally from the southwest, and will cut through the property of Clara J. Barnes, Albert Walker and H. F. Walker.

The specifications are provisions for lighting the bridge. Lamps will be installed at each end and a conduit will lead across the bridge that may be tapped in other places.

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
