WHAT WOODS CAN BE USED FOR PULP

Lane county probably has between four and six billion feet of standing timber that is suitable for pulp wood by the present methods of making pulp and paper. Hemlock, white fir and spruce are the

Pines-Wrapping paper and fiber boards.

Jack Pine—Wrapping and printing papers. Western Hemlock—News, wrapping paper and fiber board and high grade print papers. Western Hemlock is very tough and strong and has a finer texture than eastern Hemlock. About 17 per cent of all papers are made from the Hemlock

White Fir-High grade print, wrapping and book papers.

Douglas Fir-Kraft papers and fiber board. Has fair strength but is very poor in color and pitchy which makes it unsuitable for p ulp.

From this brief report it can be seen what our Hemlock and fir species excepting Douglas Fir (which in reality is a specie of pine) are very well suited to use as pulp wood.

FIGURES WITH A PUNCH

Statistics ordinarily are dry reading, but not always. An elementary geography published this year contains some tables and charts that are anything but dry reading. The information, intended primarily for youthful students, furnished by these tables and charts has more than a spark of interest for adults.

These statistics, for instance, show that although the United States has but one sixteenth of the world's population, one-fourth of the world's sugar is used in this country. Furthermore, the United States has five-eights of the world's telephones, three-eights of its railroads and four-fifths of its automobiles. It uses threefourths of all the rubber and four-fifths of all the petroleum used each year.

Each farm worker in the United States produces twelve tons of cereal although the average Department of the Interior, United cereal production for each farm worker in the rest of the world is only one and two-fifths tons. 


