### OILING OF HIGHWAY TO START SOON, SAYS WALSH

Springfield will be the starting point of a fine stretch of road, this year, Raymond Walsh, resident engineer of the state highway commission announced this morning.

Oiling of the 12-mile stretch of the McKenzie highway between here and Walterville will be started by the highway crews about May 1, the engineer stated. Exact time for starting the work will depend on weather conditions, it was said.

The work will include oiling and repairing of Second street to the bridge and the portion of road from the bridge to the junction with the Pacific highway. The city will pay for the work done within the corporate limits.

Although the work done last year proved highly satisfactory, the road will be in an even better condition this spring, Mr. Walsh said. With one coating of oil as a foundation, it will be an easy job to make a smooth, dustless road this year.
