

COUNTY POLITICS TO CENTER ON SHERIFF

Lewis M. Kletzing, Prohibition Agent, is Republican Dark Horse to Oppose Earl Luckey for Job; All Other Candidates are Listed.

Four Strong candidates lined up for the job and interest centering chiefly around this office, the race for sheriff promises to furnish a political thrill or two when the voters go to the polls.

Two republicans and two democrats were in the race when the books were closed to filing yesterday.

Luckey filed early in the season and Kletzing, field director of the National Law Enforcement League, withheld his name until late yesterday afternoon.

Two Democrats File On the democratic slate for the sheriff's office are Harry L. Bown, former county judge and sheriff and Hugh H. Earle.

For county commissioner three men are out. Clinton Hurd, republican, seeks the long term and Martin H. Anderson, republican filed for the short term.

Ben Keeney will be opposed by Frank Pay Eddy, ex-Unitarian Minister, for the office of county assessor and E. U. Lee yesterday filed for county clerk against W. B. Dillard, incumbent.

Former Resident Runs P. M. Morse, incumbent, is the only candidate for the county surveyor and E. J. Moore, incumbent, is unopposed for county school superintendent.

Springfield will find some interest in the race for county coroner, since W. F. Walker, until recently a resident of this city, is opposing W. W. Branstetter who now holds the office.

Two republicans are out for the office of constable. They are John L. Marsh, incumbent, and A. A. Branstetter.

For district attorney the republicans who have filed are: E. V. Slattery, J. Ben Hall, Donald Husband, and James King.

For representatives in the state legislature, the republicans who have filed are E. O. Potter, L. S. McCreedy, Emmett Howard and M. S. Barker.

Precinct committeemen for the four precincts who have been nominated by the republicans are: M. B. Huntly, precinct 1; H. E. Maxey, precinct 2; C. E. Kenyon, precinct 3 and Clark Wheaton, precinct 4.

He was an honored member of the Woodmen of the World having served in all the offices of the lodge, and a member of the 4-L.

He leaves besides his aged mother, Mrs. Rosa Bosserman, three brothers, Willard of Marshfield, Lester and Fred of Springfield, five sisters, Mrs. W. B. Sappingfield, Grand View, Washington, Mrs. Clair Baker, Portland, Oregon, Mrs. L. J. Crow, Mrs. Delbert McBea and Mrs. Russell Keenen of Springfield, and other more distant relatives.

The funeral will be held at the Charles P. Poole Springfield chapel Friday afternoon at 2:45, Rev. S. Earl Childers officiating. Interment will be in the Laurel Hill cemetery.
