LARGE AUDIENCE AT PIANO RECITAL GIVEN BY WINIFRID TYSON

Miss Winifrid Tyson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Tyson of Springfield, was again presented in a complete piano recital by Reuben Charly: Goffreiere, on Tuesday evening at the Laraway music hall in Eugene. An appreciative audience of 200 people welcomed Miss Tyson.

This was Miss Tyson's third consecutive season to appear in recital under Mr. Goffreiere's presentation, and each time she has demonstrated unusual talent and ability—playing from memory a difficult program, with an ease and musicianship characteristic of one with many years of experience before the public. Her artistic charm and security, added to her attractive appearance and personality, stand in her decided favor for continued progression.

Of special interest to many in the audience was the two-piano Mozart, "Sonata-Concerto in G major," with Mr. Goffreiere at the second piano.

The "double pianissimo work in Nocturne in G minor by Chopin won Miss Tyson much praise. Her instructor was especially delighted with her playing of the Hungarian Rhapsody No. 6 by Liszt, a number usually presented by artists of wide repute. She played the long and difficult number from memory. Double pianissimo work also featured the Romance in D flat by Sibyllius.

Miss Tyson received many baskets of flowers from friends in both Eugene and Springfield. More local people attended the recital than Eugene people. The choir for which she is accompanist attended in a body. She was dressed in a bone shell pink georgette gown with a Bertha collar and a bof-fant skirt.

Besides attending high school where she is an honor student, Miss Tyson has participated in musical activities of this city and taught juvenile pupils of Mr. Goffreiere here during the past season.
