

ANNUAL ROSE SHOW SET FOR SATURDAY

Fair Weather Causes Change of Date for Big Blossom Event; Classes of Entries Listed by Chairman; Judges Selected; Children Parade in Evening.

Springfield's annual rose show will be held Saturday.

This big event, sponsored by the Women's Civic club was changed from June 6 to May 26 when fair weather produced an abundance of roses in this vicinity.

Plans for the show have been completed under the direction of Mrs. C. E. Wheaton, general chairman, and her co-workers.

Doors of the store room formerly occupied by the Newland store will be opened at 8 o'clock Saturday morning. Entries may be made until 11 o'clock when judging will start.

Entries in the show will include the following four classifications: 1. Basket of 12 or more roses of one variety. 2. Vases with six roses of one variety. 3. Vases with three roses of one variety. 4. Single roses. Prizes have been arranged for each of these four classes of entries.

Judges are Selected. Judges for the rose show were announced by the chairman as follows: Elmo Chase of the Chase Gardens, Mrs. Helen Washburne Martin and Mrs. Charles P. Poole.

The parade in the evening will be one of the big events of the day. Mrs. W. C. McLagan is chairman of this part of the program. Children who participate will meet at the corner of Seventh and A streets at 6:30 o'clock to get in line for the march through the downtown section.

Entries in the parade will include the following: 1. Kitten cars, tricycles or other vehicles. 2. Doll buggies. 3. Industrial section. 4. Comic section.

In the first two divisions of the parade the entrants must be ten years of age or under and in the last two divisions they may be 14 years of age or under.

Line of March Given. The line of march will begin at Seventh and A streets, continue to Fourth, to Main on Fourth, to Seventh on Main and return to the starting place. A brief program for the youngsters will be held at this place when the parade is ended.

Marceline Seavey has been chosen queen of the parade and will ride with her attendants in a specially prepared float. The royal party includes: Ladies in waiting, Lella Maxwell, Beatrice Gillette and Blanche Bates. Donald Hawke will again act as herald, announcing the approach of the queen and her party.

Special invitation has been extended to communities near here to participate both in the rose show and in the parade. Those near here who have roses may enter them together with the Springfield roses, said Mrs. Wheaton. Children who enter the parade will be welcomed by the local committees.

Starting the season with a defeat at the hands of University high, the boys avenged themselves last night. Out of the seven games played since the season opened, the Springfield boys won six.

Graduation Events at High School Will Be Chief Feature of Close of School Year; Junior High School to Graduate; Classes Convene Sept. 10.

With the graduation exercises of the high school as the feature event, the school year will officially end here tomorrow.

In each of these schools, final examinations were held this week and students will know soon whether they pass from one grade to another or finally receive their diplomas.

The graduation program at the high school, already partly run off, will continue with the baccalaureate sermon Sunday morning at 11 o'clock in the Methodist church. At this event Rev. S. Earl Childers, pastor of the Christian church here, will be the chief speaker.

37 to Graduate. Commencement exercises, at which the 37 seniors will receive their diplomas, will be held in the Methodist church on Tuesday evening, May 29, when Prof. Victor Morris of the University of Oregon economics staff will be the speaker. At this time Chester Hayden will give the valedictory address for her class and Winifred Tyson will give the salutatory address.

Viola Penselin will give the class will and Bertha Paddock the class prophecy, both of which appeared in the "Little Maple Leaf" recently issued by the graduating class under the editorship of Dorene Larimer.

Place for the commencement exercises was changed from the high school auditorium to the church when it was decided that the church would accommodate a larger audience than the school.

High school students will attend a general assembly on the morning of May 29 to receive their report cards which will tell them their fortune in the past year's work.

Some 34 eighth graders are eligible to form next year's first year class at the high school if they pass the Lincoln Junior high examinations which were held this week.

Papers Sent In. Laurence Moffitt, principal of the Lincoln school, reported that the examination papers will be sent in to E. J. Moore, county superintendent, of schools, for grading. Returns will be available in about 10 days, it is expected. No special program is being held at this school, the principal stated.

Mrs. Ora Read Hemenway, principal of the Brattain school, stated that reports of the numbers of children who are promoted from one grade to another will be determined by Friday when the pupils will be given their report cards.

Teaching staff for the three schools for the coming year is virtually complete, it has been announced by the board of education. Applications by the score are on file with the board from people seeking positions in one of the three schools here.

Schools will open again on September 10, it was announced today.

HOW SPRINGFIELD VOTED AT ELECTION

As was the case throughout the rest of Lane county, voters of Springfield registered strong preference for candidates for national, state and county offices at the primary election last Friday.

A tabulation of the voting in the four Springfield precincts shows that the republicans almost unanimously favored Herbert Hoover for president and the vote of the democrats went largely to Al Smith. On the republican side Frank Lowden's name was written in on at least 10 ballots and on the democratic ticket Thomas J. Walsh, although he has withdrawn from the running, was given a good vote. James A. Reed and Alonzo F. Workman, both Missouri democrats, fared poorly at the hands of local voters.

Walker Runs Good Race. For contested offices in the county that of coroner was in doubt longest. W. F. Walker, former resident of this city, took the majority of votes here, and ran W. W. Branstetter, the winner, a close race throughout the county.

The precincts were divided on republican candidates for sheriff. Lewis M. Kietzing took precincts one and three and Earl E. Luckey won the other two precincts. The total vote for Luckey was 16 more than for his opponent.

In the district attorney race the republicans gave the most votes to James K. King and the democrats supported Aita King. These two candidates were nominated.

PROGRAM COMPETE FOR MEMORIAL DAY

Line of March for Parade Mapped Out by Committee; Ceremony Starts at 11 o'clock With Parade; Rev. C. H. Blom to Be Speaker at Cemetery.

Final plans for the Memorial day celebration, including the line of march and complete program, were announced this morning by M. B. Huntly, general chairman for the event.

The chairman extended an invitation to all citizens of Springfield and vicinity to attend and take part in the exercises.

The program includes a parade through the city from Sixth and Main streets to Second and South D, where all who wish to do so will take automobiles to the Laurel Hill cemetery.

At the cemetery a short Memorial day address will be delivered by Rev. C. H. Blom, pastor of the Baptist church, followed by the regular ritualistic ceremonies of the G. A. R. and the American Legion.

Boy Scouts will have charge of the national colors at the cemetery and city hall. All citizens are requested to have their flags at half mast until noon and at top mast until sunset.

The parade begins at 11 o'clock, forming at Sixth and Main streets facing west.

7. Headquarters company, 162nd Regiment, Oregon National Guard. 8. American Legion, Spanish War Veterans, all World War veterans, American Legion auxiliary. 9. Fraternal organizations: Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen, Odd Fellows, Woodmen of the World, Modern Woodmen, other fraternal orders. 10. Citizens. 11. Schools, form on Sixth with head of column on Main, Principal A. J. Morgan in charge.

The program at the cemetery will be as follows: Song, America, by audience. Invocation, Rev. Gabriel Sykes. Music, Flag of the Free. Address, Rev. C. H. Blom. Music, Star Spangled Banner. Ritualistic ceremonies, American Legion, G. A. R., and Ladies of the G. A. R.

No afternoon program will be held this year, it was decided by the committee. Attendance at the afternoon programs in the past has been poor, it was stated.

Lieut. Tom Swarts, commander of the National Guard unit here, is to have charge of the forming of the parade. Chief of Police George Valler, assisted by state traffic officers, will direct traffic during the parade and the march to the cemetery.

TEMPORARY BRIDGE IS COMPLETED; NUMBER OF WORKMEN IS INCREASED

The skeleton of a bridge now reaches across the Willamette river at the west end of Main street here. Framework of the temporary bridge which is to serve the workmen who will erect the steel and pour the concrete for the big structure now under construction, reached the opposite side of the river this week.

A heavy pile driver has put down piling which will support the men and machinery as the further operations progress.

The crew at the bridge has been enlarged to a considerable extent. Some of them have been busy excavating for the four piers which will be the foundation of the new bridge.

The stage of the river has been favorable to the workmen. It had been feared that the river would reach a flood stage this spring and hinder operations to a considerable extent.

The next step will be erecting the steel and pouring the cement for the big piers, it was stated.
