TEMPORARY BRIDGE IS COMPLETED; NUMBER OF WORKMEN IS INCREASED

The skeleton of a bridge now reaches across the Willamette river at the west end of Main street here. Framework of the temporary bridge which is to serve the workmen who will erect the steel and pour the concrete for the big structure now under construction, recahed the opposite side of the river this week.

A heavy pile driver has put down piling which will support the men and machinery as the further operations progress.

The crew at the bridge has been enlarged to a considerable extent. Some of them have been busy excavating for the four piers which will be the foundation of the new bridge.

The stage of the river has been favorable to the workmen. It had been feared that the river would reach a flood stage this spring and hinder operations to a considerable
