TURKEY MEN DISCUSS MARKET ASSOCIATION BIG INCREASE SHOWN

Advisability of organizing a Lane county turkey raisers association will be investigated as a result of a meeting of turkey men held Tuesday afternoon. The association would deal principally with marketing problems, it was stated.

A committee was named to canvass the situation, confer with Douglas county turkey raisers who are forming a similar organization and report at a later meeting. The committee consists of C. W. Godlove, motor route B; H. A. Stoneberg, Coburg; L. Christensen, Eugene; Harvey Handley, Eugene motor route C; H. A. Pontius, Creswell route 1; R. R. Gibson, motor route A and E. W. Eyanson, Lorane.

L. R. Breitpaut, extension specialist at O. A. C. discussed marketing in general and told of the turkey marketing system used by raisers in Idaho and eastern Oregon.

Eleven of the 20 raisers at the meeting Tuesday reported that they are arising 6000 turkeys to market next fall. The same raisers had only 2580 turkeys last year.

WONDERS OF NEW YORK DESCRIBED IN LETTER FROM C. E. KENYON, JR.

Some of the wonders of New York as seen through the eyes of a westerner are described in a letter received this week by Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Kenyon from their son, C. E. Kenyon, Jr., who has gone to that city to make his home.

There is so much to see in New York that it is disturbing to know there is so little time to see it all. The letter in part follows:

"I have found New York extremely interesting. I think you would have to live here for years before you could ever have a very thorough knowledge of the city. Manhattan island is extremely interesting. It is here that all the big skyscrapers are situated. Wall street, famous the world over, is one of these little narrow passages scarcely four blocks long, packed with people, and two cars can barely pass each other in the street. At the end of the street and in the shadows of towering buildings, is the lovely and quaint old Trinity church with its tall steeple.

"Fifth avenue is another interesting street, but it is interesting in a different manner than lower Broadway and Wall street. It is here all the wonderful shops are located. As you proceed up Fifth you come to Central Park where a large part of the wealthy people of New York live. As you look down the street as far as you can see are large beautiful homes and apartments. These apartments rent all the way from \$3500 to \$35,000 a month."

The letter also describes a visit to the Metropolitan art museum which Mr. Kenyon says is a place beyond accurate description.

This was the theme of the graduation address by Dr. Jesse R. Kellems, noted evangelist, given before 560 students who received degrees at the fiftieth annual commencement exercises at the University of Oregon Monday, June 11.

Three Springfield students, Mabel C. Roof, Thelma E. Sweeney and Carl L. Rice, received degrees at the exercises. Mable Roof graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree in English.
