Y., council and urged the adoption of an ordinance to prohibit the sale and discharge of fireworks there. The ordinance was passed, but too late so far as the bereaved parents were concerned.

We have found that there was nothing irregular in the action of the police officers of this city recently in quieting a disturbance caused by shooting of firecrackers and wish to say that we have confidence that these officers will properly enforce the city
