## LIQUOR CONVICTIONS IN LANE COUNTY RUN HIGH, REPORT SHOWS

Of the 707 liquor cases filed between January 1925 and July 1928, 537 were convicted on pleas of guilty and trail, a report issued from the office of District Attorney John S. Medley yesterday indicates.

This means that 79 percent of the cases filed resulted in conviction. The period covered is the term of office of Mr. Medley, who divides honors with Gordon S. Wells, deputy prosecutor.

Sentences resulting from these activities totaled 24,449 days. Twenty-four and a half years of penitentiary sentences were given Lane county liquor law violators. Fines assessed during the period totaled \$97,305.00 and of this amount \$65,520.60 was paid.

Fifty percent of the fines goes into the state prohibition commissioner's fund until he receives a total of \$50,000 and from then on the remainder is paid into the county general emergency fund.

## 10,000 PEOPLE VISIT SHOWING OF NEW BUICK

More than 10,000 Lane county people saw the new "silver anniversary" Buick displayed at the Pettyjohn Motor company showrooms last week, according to attaches of the company. Among this group of visitors was a large number of Springfield people, it was reported.

## LANE COUNTY FAIR WILL BE SEPT. 5 - 8

Eugene, August 9—(Special)—Lane county's fair dressed in new buildings and with a varied program of entertainment that will include everything from the perennial merry-go-round to fireworks and horse races, will open September 5 and continue over September 8, in four days of supreme effort to make it a "bigger and better" fair than ever before.

"We must have a bigger and better fair this year if we are to continue having Lane county fairs," states Mrs. Mabel Chadwick, secretary of the board.

Everything we can do to put it over and make it a fair to be remembered, and incidentally to be remembered favorably, is being done. No stone will be left unturned to build this road to a success in 1928.

"We have new buildings and have painted up and cleaned up the old ones. We have moved the stables and graded around the track. Among the new buildings is the industrial building financed by 36 Eugene merchants, and in which they each will have an exhibit. There is also the 4-H club building which will represent hundreds of boys and girls of Lane county who are in this club movement. A new concession pavilion and a new automobile show building are featured among other improvements at the grounds this year."

Premium list recently gotten out by the fair board, shows that approximately \$5000 will be given in cash prizes to winners in the livestock show. Horses alone will bring their owners nearly \$1000.

All persons making entries are urged to follow the rules and instructions as set forth in the premium list. The fair grounds will be open for the reception of exhibits two days before the fair opens.
