KOLSTER TO GO WITH BYRD TO SOUTH POLE

Ellery W. Stone, president of the Kolster Radio corporation, announced this morning that an order has been placed by the Byrd Ant-arctic Expedition, scheduled to sail from New York on August 15 for a year and a half of exploration around the South Pole, for Kolster radio compasses, broadcast receivers, loud speakers and head-

"This scientific expedition of 55' men will be better and more completely equipped with radio apparatus than any band of explorers in history and. because lives depend upon it, great care has been taken in its selection," said Mr. Stone. "It is a matter of profound satisfaction to Kalster Radio and Commander Byrd and his staff of radio experts have chosen Kolster equipment for such an exacting test. Much of the success of the expedition will depend upon accurate radio direction-finding, both on the voyage down to the ice base at the Bay of Whales and during subsequent explorations by radio-equipped airplanes and sled parties setting out from the base near the South Pole.

"The Kolster radio compass will be used, one on the base trip and another in a portable radio house about 10 miles removed, to form a base-line for triangulation on radio signals from a later blackberries and huckleberries, advance parties, so their exact location will always be known.


