

BELL THEATRE HAS NEW IMPROVED SHOW ORGAN

A theatre organ of the latest design has been installed and is now in operation at the Bell theatre, it was announced this morning by J. M. Larson, manager.

The new instrument, which was put in at considerable expense, is capable of producing music similar to that of a pipe organ and also reproduces band music.

The organ, called a Magnola, is similar to that used by many of the larger theatres throughout the coun-

try and is a big improvement over ordinary piano instrumentation in that it includes reproductions of the tones of several instruments at the same time.

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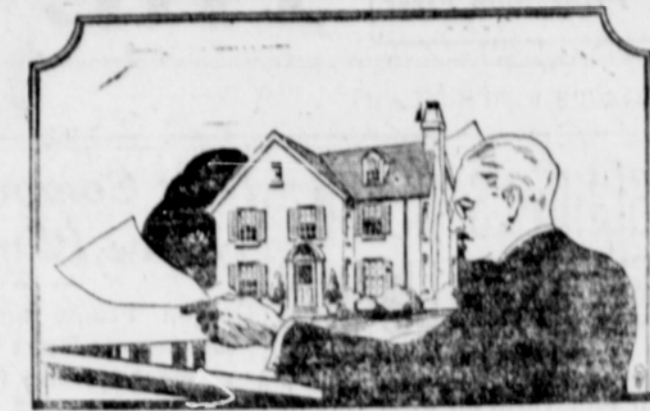


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Remodeling Residence—Pete Herrington is this week doing remodeling work in his home just north of Springfield.
