So far the director, Prof. Andrew Landles, has been paid by fees collect ed from the membership of the band. This arrangement, although it served to get the organization started, is not satisfactory, Mr. Phillips stated, for the reason that experienced players who are giving their time to the band do not feel that they should also contribute to its upkeep. Fees for the beginner's would not be sufficient to meet expenses.
