

SPRINGFIELD BAND TO ASK FOR FUNDS

City Has Appropriation Set Aside by Former Special Elec- tion and Budget Committee will be Asked Monday to Re- turn Item to 1929 Expenses.

Feeling that the organization may now justly be called a band, officials of Springfield's new civic band will Monday night visit the session of the budget committee and request that the appropriation set aside for its support be returned to the budget at once.

After being organized during the summer and autumn months and after making one public appearance with the only outside volunteered by the Springfield Lions club, the band believes it is time to get on a firm financial footing. H. K. Phillips, manager stated this morning.

When Springfield formerly had a band a special election was held and an appropriation was provided amounting to \$225 or \$250 a year. This appropriation is still on the books. The money was, of course, not set aside during the years when there was no band, but will now be asked for.

Bandsmen Pay Director

So far the director, Prof. Andrew Landles, has been paid by fees collected from the membership of the band. This arrangement, although it served to get the organization started, is not satisfactory, Mr. Phillips stated, for the reason that experienced players who are giving their time to the band do not feel that they should also contribute to its upkeep. Fees for the beginner's would not be sufficient to meet expenses.

At the benefit concert last Friday night, sponsored by the Lions club, enough money was raised to meet all old bills with a small amount left in the treasury, Mr. Phillips said. Other benefit concerts will be given periodically and the band will play "jobs" when ever the opportunity presents itself.

The director this week started his players on a new group of more difficult music and at the same time opened the roster of the band to new beginning students. Young players, with or without experience, are needed, Prof. Landles stated.

LUMBER MILL MAN IS INJURED AS BIG LOG JUMPS FROM CHUTE

O. A. Davis, partner in the Davis and Davis mill in the Mohawk valley, is in the Eugene hospital suffering from a slight fracture of the skull and other injuries as a result of an accident at the mill at 10 o'clock Monday morning.

Logs for the mill are carried down from the mountains in a long chute in which at one place there is a sharp turn. One heavy log coming down the chute at a terrific speed jumped the chute and stuck in a gravel bank near where Mr. Davis was standing. A large rock was propelled against his head, cutting his scalp deeply, injuring one eye and fracturing his skull slightly.

He was hurried to the Eugene hospital where it is reported by his attending physician Tuesday morning, that although the injuries were serious they are not critical and that he will undoubtedly recover.

CHAMBER TO HEAR ELECTION ISSUES

Both Democratic and Republican Candidates and Representatives of Organizations for and Against Ballot Measures Invited to Appear October 26.

An open forum for the discussion of the measures and talks by the candidates to be voted upon at the November election, will be conducted at the next meeting of the Springfield Chamber of Commerce Friday evening, October 26. Besides the county candidates in the contested offices, it is expected that the following measures will be discussed by speakers both for and against: The river closing bill, the Dunne automobile license and gas tax bills, the grange income tax bill, and the county four-mill road levy. For the purpose of the discussion the river closing bills and the Dunne bills will be considered as one.
