Hoover retained the lead he gained early in the voting, but his lead has been quite slight during the major

Several times it seemed as if Smith were going to upset Hoover's lead, but never did the New Yorker quite make it. His ballot kept fluctuating near Hoover's mark dangerously, but never got above it.
