For the council there are at least SPRINGFIELD ELEVEN two contests for seats. The closest race is expected between the candidates for the two-year term 'on the council. W. C. McLagan, steam superintendent at the Mountain States Power company plant here, and Harry M. Stewart, Springfield fuel dealer, both seek this one seat. Each are being given strong support, it is stated. Mr. Stewart is now serving out the unexpired term of George Stewart as an appointee of the council and Mayor Bushman.
