## VOTE IT STRAIGHT

Never before in our more than 20 years connection with newspapers have we advised voters to vote a straight ticket. But in this campaign the Democrats have raised issues and used methods that should not have been brought up. Their unsound issues strike at the very foundation of our government. They deserve a sound beating and the best way to give it to them is by rolling up large Republican majorities and by keeping all democratic candidates out of office.

State's right, prohibition and religion are things we have settled in our constitution long ago. The Democrats have no moral right to bring them into this campaign. And if the democratic party was a responsible one instead of being in the grasp of Tammany Hall and a lot of other selfish faction these things would not have been issues in this campaign.

The democratic party, we are sorry to say because we believe in two strong parties, has lost its true democratic complexion. A great majority of the true democrats can no longer find a place for their political expressions in this party since it has been scuttled for Al Smith's socialistic and intolerant issues. Consequently they have gone over to the Republicans and the disgruntled element in the Republican party have turned to Smith. The Republican party is lucky to lose them.

State's rights were settled by the Civil war, prohibition by a vote of 46 states, and religion's place in this country was fixed by the framers of the constitution. To go back and dig these things up is to retard progress in this country and create political chaos.

Al Smith repudiated the democratic platform just as soon as he was nominated. Like the Kaiser he has his own platform and it is one he shifts around to fit the occasion. He talks one thing in the east, another in the west and still another in the south and is the height of inconsistency. Political expediency has caused him to attempt to muster the minority of all these lost causes—and what a motly crowd he has.

When the Republicans have shown up the mistaken attitude taken by this sort of politicians by a decisive beating at the polls, then the democrats, we feel, will reorganize along sounder political lines. A decisive defeat at this election will be good for the democratic party in the future as well as victory for the Republicans will insure continued progress. Patriotic citizens who have only their country's welfare at heart can only do one thing this time—Vote a straight Republican ticket.

## THE MEASURES

There are nine measures on the ballot to be voted on November 6 yet only one has sufficient merit to receive a "Yes" vote.

The four mill tax for the completion of the McKenzie and Coast highways, initiated by the county court, should receive the approval again of the voters. If it had not been for an error in the notice at last election, this money would have been raised and the highways finished.

The four-mill tax will raise \$200,000 and it will be matched with \$400,000 of federal and state money. In other words for each dollar we vote two dollars of match money is available. This is a real opportunity to finish these highways and also to get the state to take over the expensive maintenance. Vote "Yes" on 316.

Swat the state measures—let the legislature make the needed laws.

## LUCKEY HAS BEEN UNLUCKY

Earl Luckey, republican candidate for sheriff, has been handicapped in his campaign for the office by forces over which he has no control. The sheriff's office has been the target for criticism when the irregularities have really been in the district attorney's office. Lawbreakers and opponents of Mr. Luckey have tried their best to use the unpleasant happenings in the District attorney's office to defeat him. The grand jury investigation left them without a leg to stand on so far as Mr. Luckey is concerned. It completely vindicated him.

The republican central committee, elected by the people to further the candidacy of those nominated for office on the republican ticket, have examined carefully Mr. Luckey's record as a deputy sheriff. The committee is 100 per cent for his election. He has assured the committee that he will make the desired reforms in the sheriff's office and the committee has confidence he will be able to conduct the office better than ever before.

Luckey believes in straight forward, fair and strict enforcement of the law.

He does not believe in the use for law enforcement of stool-pigeons, convicted criminals and other questionable characters.

Neither does he believe that houses should be searched without warrants and other rights violated guaranteed to citizens by the constitution.

Luckey's 12 years connection with the sheriff's office has taught him how to handle every department. He is thoroughly capable and young enough to handle the job well.

Against his opponent we have not one word of criticism but he is an older man seeking a very active job. He was sheriff before the enactment of prohibition when the duties of the office were not nearly so heavy as they are now.

The sheriff's office requires a young, active and capable man. Earl Luckey fills the bill and he should receive the support of every good republican.

No water for irrigation, mining, electricity, lumbering, railroads, or for city use can ever be had in the future from the McKenzie, Deschutes, Rogue and Umpqua rivers if the four river bills carry. Not even can a summer resort take water out of these rivers under the measure which bars all commercial use. These bills are too drastic. Let's put an end to them November 6.

If we don't finish the McKenzie highway now the federal money available will be diverted to the Santiam route, to our great expense and disadvantage of being deprived of the main cross state route. Think of this when you read the last measure on the ballot.

The true name of the Dunne bills should be the truck and stage measures, since those are really the things they seek to help. They should receive a big "NO" November 6.
