

HOOVER VOTE BIG ON LOCAL RETURNS

Bown Defeats Luckey for Sheriff and Alta King Beats James King by Margin of 12 Votes; Dunne Measures and Fish Bills Lose; Road Levy Passed.

Hoover defeated Smith by a score of 652 to 132 in the four Springfield precincts, according to complete returns. In each of the precincts his lead early in the day grew toward evening and when the final count was made the winner's lowest ratio was more than four to one.

In the contested offices in Lane county, Springfield voters chose Bown in preference to Luckey for the office of sheriff. Bown received a total of 539 votes as compared with 243 votes for Luckey. The nearest they came together in number of votes was in Precinct No. 1 at the high school where Bown took 94 and Luckey 49.

Alta King defeated James K. King here by the small margin of 14 votes. In Precinct No. 1 James King bested his opponent by three votes and in the third precinct his lead was 11 votes. In the fourth precinct their vote stood only one apart, with Alta King taking 97 votes and James King winning 95 votes.

Dunne Bills Snowed Under

Both the Dunne auto bills, the first providing a five-cent gasoline tax and the other reducing motor vehicle license fees, were lost here by a wide margin.

Four bills which aimed to close the Deschutes, Rogue, Umpqua and McKenzie rivers to commercial development met the same defeat. The vote was approximately four to 1 against each of these measures.

The bill authorizing Lane county to exceed the constitutional six per cent limit and levy \$200,000 for proposed improvements on the McKenzie highway and the Willamette Valley-Florence highway was carried here by an large majority.

SPRINGFIELD FOLKS PLAN QUIET HOLIDAY FOR ARMISTICE DAY

Observance of the tenth anniversary of the signing of the armistice which ended the world war will be quiet in Springfield.

The day falls on Sunday, November 11, but Monday will be observed as a holiday.

The only event on the calendar here for that day will be the football game between Springfield and Junction City high schools which will be played on Brattain field at 2 o'clock.

Most merchants announced this week that they will close their places of business for the entire day. Some will remain open for a part of the day. The postoffice, banks and the city hall will be closed as usual on a holiday.

Many Springfield people are taking advantage of the double holiday furnished by Sunday and armistice day to drive to other cities for week-end visits. A number plan to attend the air circus to be staged at the Eugene municipal airport in the afternoon Monday.

ADMITTED SLAYER OF EUGENE BRAKEMAN IN LANE COUNTY PRISON

Joseph L. McDaniel, 23, admitted killer of E. A. McGrew, Southern Pacific brakeman near Westfir last Thursday evening was captured Friday night by a railroad employe and is now in the Lane county jail awaiting arraignment.

Search for the youth who stabbed the brakeman as the latter was attempting to put him off the train did not take very long. With posses and bloodhounds combing the hills near the scene of the crime and with the only possible avenue of escape by way of the railroad anyone not familiar with the hills and wooded country had little chance of escape.

After his capture the youth admitted stabbing the slain man but has not yet been given his hearing. He spent his twenty-third birthday in the county jail while funeral services were being conducted for the murdered trainman.

BLACKSMITH INJURED AS HORSE FALLS UPON HIM

Jesse Walker, Springfield blacksmith, sustained a fractured ankle Wednesday morning when a horse which he was shoeing slipped and fell upon him. The horse belongs to the Stewart Fuel company.

After first aid treatment here, Mr. Walker, a veteran of the world war, rushed to the Portland veterans' hospital. He was injured at 10:15 o'clock and at noon he was on a train bound for Portland. Mrs. M. B. Huntly, chairman of the American Legion auxiliary, made arrangements for getting the injured man to Portland and into the hospital.

LOCAL SCOUTMASTERS IN CLASSES AT EUGENE

Springfield Boy Scout leaders are attending the scoutmasters' school which is being conducted in Eugene under the direction of C. R. Clark, Lane county executive.

McKENZIE AND COAST HIGHWAY LEVIES ARE CARRIED IN ELECTION

Although the majority was not overwhelming, the tax levy providing \$200,000 for improvement of the McKenzie highway and the Willamette Valley-Florence highway carried in Tuesday's election. The total vote, with 98 of the 101 precincts complete, was 7269 for the levy and 6836 against it.

By expected appropriations from the state highway commission and the federal bureau of roads Lane county will receive an additional \$400,000 to apply on these two highways. Of the total amount \$200,000 will be applied to the McKenzie work and the other \$400,000 to the coast road.

OPEN HOUSE AT NEW LIBRARY QUARTERS SET FOR SATURDAY

In its new quarters in the old First National bank building at the northeast corner of Second and Main streets, the Springfield city library will hold open house Saturday afternoon, November 10. Plans for the event were outlined at a meeting of the library board Monday afternoon.

Moving expenses and some repair to the new quarters cost only \$30 as the result of several firms donating labor and material, it was reported. Mrs. L. K. Page will purchase curtains for the new building and the board members will meet today at the home of Mrs. Emery to sew on them.

BOWN AND ALTA KING WIN; COUNTY SUMMARY IS GIVEN

Democratic Candidate for County Sheriff Given Heaviest Vote of Any Man on Ballot; Two Kings are Separated by Only 500 Votes in Final Returns.

With only three precincts in the county which have not turned in complete election returns, winners of contested county and district offices were certain this morning.

In the sheriff's race Harry Bown, democrat, received the largest vote of any nominee on the ballot, defeating Earl Luckey, republican, but a majority of more than 4000 votes. The final gave Bown 10,831 and Luckey 6341.

Alta King, democrat, won the district attorneyship from James K. King, his republican opponent. With 98 out of the 101 precincts heard from Alta King had 8557 votes as compared with 8070 for his opponent. Many times during the day voting was first in favor of one and then the other, but toward the last Alta King picked up a lead and continued it until all the precincts had been completed.

For county school superintendent, Edgar J. Moore retained his office by a

margin of almost 3000 votes over Mrs. Vera Todd Crow, democrat. The vote for Moore was 9648 and for Mrs. Crow 6989.

Clinton Hurd won the long term place on the county commission against I. E. Steele. O. E. Crowe defeated J. H. Moffett for the short term place.

Potter, McCready and Howard won seats in the state legislature. The number of votes each received ran in the same order as their names are listed.

Hawley for congress was a heavy winner. Rand and Rossman rolled up heavy majorities for supreme court places. Hal Hoss for secretary of state was more than four to one favorite against any of his opponents. Van Winkle for attorney general was almost four to one winner over either of his opponents.

Vote for three circuit judges ran in the following order: Skipworth, 14,508; Hamilton, 12,865; Brand, 12,926.

Every state measure on the ballot, except the income tax, was defeated in Lane county. The four river and fish bills were decisively beaten and the bill to limit the power of the legislature was defeated.

ZACK KINTZLEY IS ONLY MEMBER OF G. A. R. POST

Zack Kintzley is now the only member of the Springfield post of the G. A. R. living in this city.

Last week his only companion in this organization, Fred W. Brown, passed on at the age of 88 years.

Now, Mr. Kintzley, who himself is 82 years of age, is president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer and full membership of the local order. Another member lives in California, but does not intend to return here.

There are four other veterans of the Civil war living in Springfield, but either they belong to the Eugene post or none at all.

Male Quartet is Formed—A male quartet composed of Oscar Gladdish, Laurence Moffitt, Glen Cole, all faculty members, and Paul Potter, has been formed in the high school. The quartet appeared in several numbers at an assembly this week.

A mixed quartet composed of Miss Louisa McDowell, Mr. and Mrs. Dallas Murphy and B. O. Smith, will sing "Sweet Peace" in the evening and the choir will present a special.

As a special number in the morning Mrs. Dallas Murphy will sing "Eyes Hath Not Seen" taken from "The Holy City" by Gaul.

VOTING IS HEAVY FOR CITY OFFICES

Wilson Elected Mayor, Taylor Cox and McLagan Get Seats on City Council; Peterson and Hughes Retain Posts as Recorder and Treasurer.

Voters in Springfield cast the largest vote on record in the election held Tuesday. Candidates for city offices received the strongest support ever shown in a city election.

For the mayoralty C. O. Wilson was the only nominee, but W. F. Walker's name was written in by 21 voters. Mr. Wilson's vote was 610.

Other names written in for mayor were those of L. L. May, 1 H. J. Cox, 1; B. S. Colter, 1; Frank Fisher, 1; W. H. Adrian, 1; W. A. Haack, 1; E. R. Danner, 1; G. G. Bushman, 1; H. E. Maxey, 1; Dr. Carl Phetteplace, 1;

Taylor Leads Councilmen

W. A. Taylor led all the councilmen in the total number of votes polled. For the four-year term on the council his total was 615. H. J. Cox received the second seat for the four-year period, his total being 469. Sam Richmond, the third candidate for the job, was given 287 votes.

W. C. McLagan defeated Harry Stewart in the race for the two-year term by a vote of 461 to 261. His vote was larger in each of the four precincts.

I. M. Peterson for city recorder and William G. Hughes for city treasurer tied in the total number of votes polled in the four local precincts. Each was given a vote of 673. The name of Dwight Kessey was written in in Precinct No. 3 for the office of treasurer.
