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ALFALFA SHOULD BE SOWN WITH A DRILL MR. FLETCHER FINDS

Results of the past four seasons have demonstrated clearly that every Lane county farmer should sow his alfalfa with a drill is possible, according to O. S. Fletcher, county agent. Farmers can depend on getting better stands of alfalfa with ten pounds of seed drilled into the ground than with fifteen pounds broadcast.

Recently the county agent obtained quotations on grass seed attachments for all of the standard makes of drills. It was found that the average price of the complete grass seed attachment for six-foot drills is \$9.00 and that complete attachments for eight-foot drills cost an average of about \$12.00.

When alfalfa seed sells at forty cents per pound the difference in the cost of seed for an acre of alfalfa drilled and an acre broadcast at the rates of seeding mentioned above is \$2.00. Therefore, if a farmer sows a field of four and one-half acres of alfalfa he can save the cost of a grass seed attachment for a six-foot drill in one year. He can save the cost of an attachment for an eight-foot drill on six acres in one year. It should be remembered that the saving in cost of seed is really not as important as the insurance of a good stand.

Mr. Fletcher recommends that farmers who expect to purchase grass seed attachments for their drills do so soon and get the drills ready for spring use before the rush of spring work.
