SHIP OF PRESIDENT-ELECT HOOVER AND PARTY HAS SPRINGFIELD BOY ON DECK

Springfield, Oregon is being represented aboard the United States battleship Maryland, which is carrying President-elect and Mrs. Herbert Hoover and their party on the "good will" tour of Latin-American countries and South America.

Roy Briggs, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. V. Briggs of West Springfield, is the local lad who is doing naval duty aboard the ship. Young Briggs sent a letter to his mother in which he told of his good luck, and he is expected to relate details of his trip and his possible conversation with the coming president of the United States in future letters to his folks in Springfield.

The voyage will take the Springfield boy and the future leader of the nation through the various Latin-American countries, the Panama canal, Brazil, Argentina, Chile and many other South American countries, winding their way back via Miami or Key West in Florida shortly before Hoover's inauguration on March 4.

With such an itinerary practically mapped out for the sea trip, Springfield can expect in time to hear vivid tales from direct sources about wonders of the places to the South of the United States, if young Briggs should ever return to his home town.

Roy Briggs attended high school for one year in Eugene, after which he spent a few years working in the woods. On October 28, 1927, the young Springfield man who now boards the Hoover special enlisted in the navy. He was then sent for training at the United States naval school at Hampton Roads, Virginia. He graduated from the mechanical division of the school at Hampton Roads, and following his graduation he spent one month about the school.

He was then sent for duty at San Pedro, California, where the U. S. S. Maryland was located. He was there ordered aboard the battleship for active work.

Hoover and his party left on the Maryland on November 19th, when young Briggs celebrated his twenty-first birthday.
