POSTMASTER WARNS OF CHRISTMAS MAIL RUSH

Special care in wrapping Christmas packages and the necessity of sending wrapped parcels for the holidays as early as possible is urged by F. B. Hamlin, Springfield postmaster, who is in receipt of a message from the national headquarters stating that postmen this year will not be required to work on Christmas day.

Because of the new regulation, Postmaster Hamlin, advises Springfield people of the necessity of sending packages so that they may be received at their pointed destination by December 24, instead of the next day when they will not be delivered.

The rapid increase in number of air mail routes is looked upon by postmasters as a good means for Christmas shoppers to profit by. An active campaign is being conducted to encourage the package senders to insure and register their mail, because, it is pointed out, disappointment will be avoided in case of damage or loss.

Packages should be wrapped carefully with strings put on tight and paper put on compactly, the national department states in its message.
