

PRODUCTION SURVEY OF SMALL MILLS UNDER WAY

Seattle, Wash., Dec. 13.—A production survey of the small mills in the Douglas fir region of Washington and Oregon, designed to determine the amount of their output during 1928, is being conducted by the West Coast Lumbermen's association. The association get week by week reports on production from 233 of the principal West Coast mills. The purpose of the survey is to obtain production figures from all the mills not supplying reports to the association regularly.

The association hopes to be able to issue shortly after the first of the year an accurate collective report on the total production of Douglas fir, West Coast hemlock, western red cedar and Sitka spruce in Washington and Oregon during 1928. The percentage of the total output of lumber produced by the small mills in this region has always been a more or less unknown quantity. With representatives of the association calling on many of the firms not reporting production figures regularly, and with various agencies

in the different districts co-operating with the association, it is believed that the results will enable the Association to present a clear picture of the total lumber production for the year.

ORDINANCE NO. 534

An Ordinance to impose a license fee upon and requiring a license of plumbers and electricians in the Town of Springfield.

THE TOWN OF SPRINGFIELD DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. In addition to the inspection of electrical wiring and plumbing provided for by ordinance and the fee charged therefor and other regulation thereof now in force and effect, it is hereby provided as follows: That there shall be imposed upon every electrician or plumber before he is al-

lowed to do business or follow his respective trade in the Town of Springfield a license fee of Twenty Five Dollars per year. The said license shall be issued by the recorder upon application to him for the same upon the payment of said fee, but the recorder shall not issue any such license for a shorter period than one year and no lesser amount than the said Twenty-Five Dollars shall be charged for such license.

Section 2. For a violation of the provisions of this ordinance the penalty shall be a fine of not less than Twenty Five Dollars, nor more than One Hundred Dollars upon conviction thereof in the recorder's court of said Town of Springfield.

Passed the Common Council this 10th day of December, 1928.

OREGON STATE NEWS OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Assembled for Information of Our Readers.

Installation of the electric light and power line is in progress on the proposed Dayton-Wheatland system. The Yamhill Electric company of Newberg is sponsoring this project.

A carload of lime has arrived at Canby from the state lime plant and is being distributed to farmers of Clackamas county at \$7.95 per ton, with \$2 credit for return of sacks.

Mrs. Pansy Imislund, 38, resident of Knappa, near Astoria, was killed instantly when she was struck by a logging train while crossing a trestle belonging to the Crossett Western Logging company.

For the past two years the city valuation of Newport has been steadily decreasing. The 1929 budget was based on a \$20,000 decrease in valuation, much city owned property being eliminated from the tax roll.

The Gunderson store at Diamondville, half mile from the lime plant of the Portland Cement company near Baker, was destroyed by fire recently. The entire stock of groceries and general supplies also was destroyed.

Immediate plans for starting a fund with which to build a new courthouse to replace the ancient schoolhouse which has served the purpose for 20 years since Hood River county was established, have been abandoned.

A so-called double-knot netting machine for knitting nets for salmon twine has arrived in Salem from France and will be installed in the Miles linen mills there. The machine will be installed by a mechanic who accompanied the machine to Salem.

Three carloads of turkeys, comprising the second pool to be shipped through the Idaho Turkey Growers' association, left Hermiston recently. Unsatisfactory prices offered in Boise, Idaho, resulted in a decision to ship the birds direct to New York, where they will be sold on consignment.

Plans for the construction of a state fish hatchery on Fall creek, to replace the Tumalo hatchery, were made known in Bend when the Deschutes county court agreed to give \$200 toward the purchase of the site. The new hatchery will be about two miles east of the present "eyeing station."

The non-resident motor vehicle sticker for the year 1929 will be printed in three colors and will carry an outline map of the state of Oregon and a photograph of Mount Hood. The new sticker was designed by Hal Hoss, secretary of state. Approximately 100,000 of these stickers will be required.

The Oregon newspaper conference annual session will be held at the University of Oregon February 21, 22 and 23, according to Frank Appleby, publisher of the LaGrande Observer, president of the conference. This date was selected after a questionnaire had been sent to all Oregon publishers.

Four rural schools, which were open last year near Talent, are closed and the pupils are transported by busses to the Ashland schools. Two schools, the Siskiyou and Greenspring districts, were closed last year, and those closed this year include Soda Springs, Dead Indian, Pilot Rock and Pinehurst districts.

The new federal courthouse in Portland has been allotted an additional \$500,000 out of the lump sum appropriation for continuing public construction, carried by the treasury appropriations bill introduced in the house, making \$1,100,000 in all which will be available for the building when it is begun.

Ashland's pride of achievement, representing more than a million dollars of improvements made there during the last year was predominant last week in the dedication of three of the major projects, which have just been completed by the city, Reeder gulch dam, new street lights and new lithia drinking fountain.

The Douglas county turkey pool, consisting of approximately 11 carloads, will be sold on a consignment basis, with an advance of 32 cents, top price, to the growers, the directors of the Douglas County Co-operative Turkey Growers' association announced recently, following three days of conference regarding the disposal of the crop.

Some 5,000,000 fresh water shrimp are to arrive in Portland soon, according to Matt L. Ryckman, superintendent of hatcheries for the Oregon state game commission. They are tremendously prolific and are declared an ideal fish food. This first batch will be taken to the McKenzie hatchery with the aim later to plant the shrimp in Oregon lakes and streams, particularly where fish food is insufficient to sustain life.

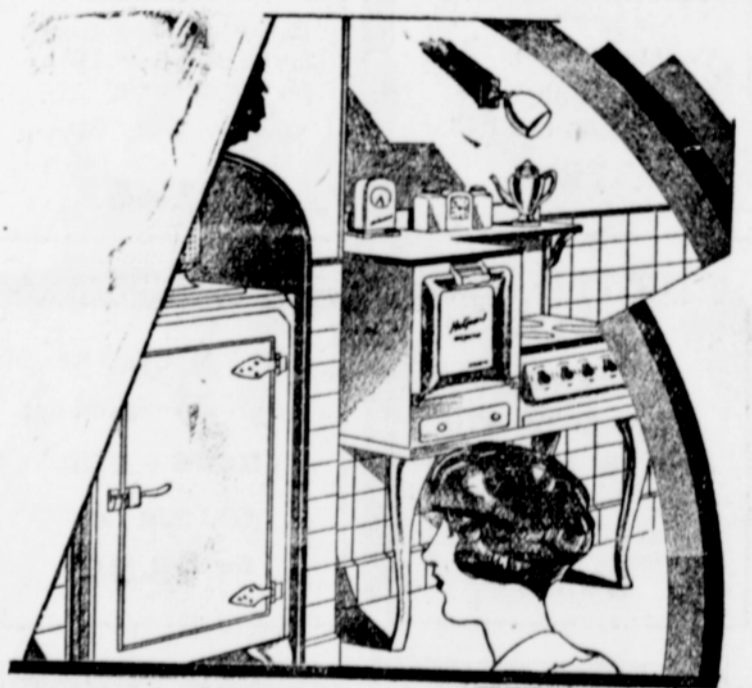
