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Springfield Mill Makes Good Production Record in 10 Years

Springfield can boast of the largest mill and grain plant between Portland and Sacramento. The amazing part of the story is that this has been built up since 1919 from a defunct concern.

In 1919 G. G. Bushman bought from Elmer Payne through a receiver the concern which is now known as the Springfield Mill and Grain company on Mill street. At that time the milling capacity was 180,000 bushels per day while now it is 225,000 bushels per day. Besides putting the institution on its feet financially and sub stantially increasing its capacity, Mr Bushman has added other large units of output. A commercial feed plant has been added which is modern and up-to-date in every respect and which has a capacity of 20 tons per day There is also in connection with the plant a wholesale grain business which handles all coarse grains such as barley and corn

The story which Mr. Bushman tells; of his efforts in Oregon is a good demonstration of what clear thinking and concentrated application can do. Mr. Bushman came from Haven, Kansas. in 1907 where he had gotten his first experience in the milling business. He moved that year to Sheridan where he bought the Yambill Milling and Power company. He operated the plant in Sheriden until 1912. During this time he practically doubled the output, increasing the milling capacity from 75 barrels per day to 150 barres per day. He also increased the lighting business several-fold building up the pat. concern at that time to a much larger fall was slippery pavement. number when he sold out in 1912.
