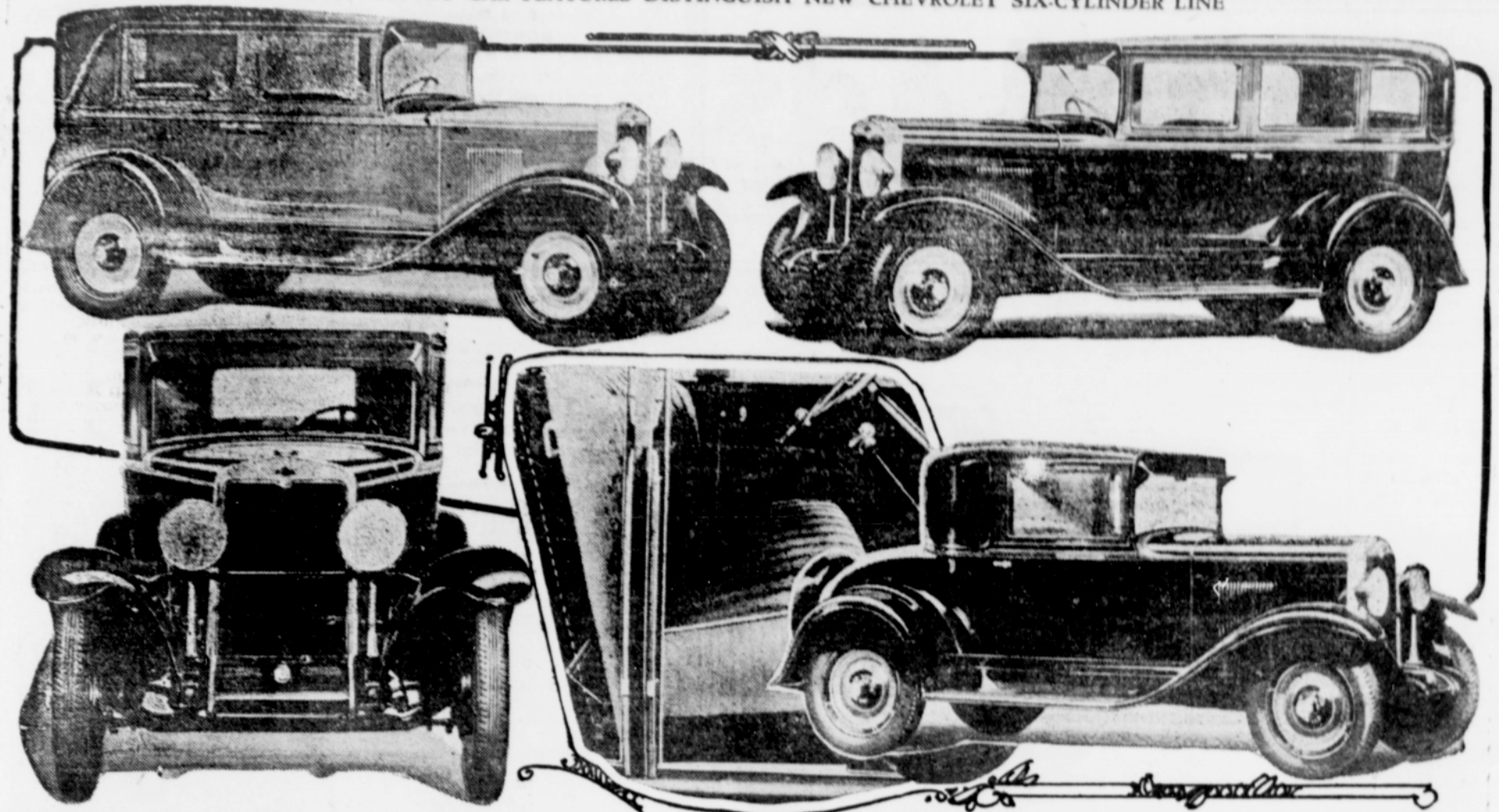
Mr. and Mrs. James Calvert from Junction City visited their daughter Mrs. John Edmiston last Tuesday.

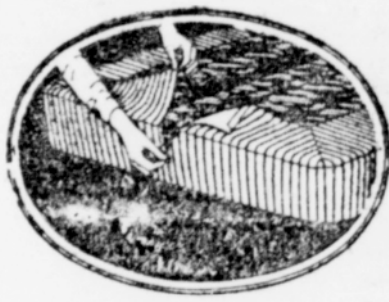

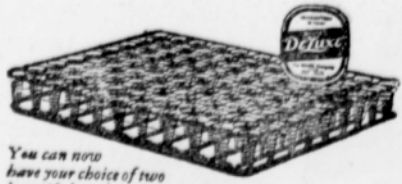
