

FALLING PULLEY CAUSES DEATH OF G. HICKMAN WEST FIR CO. EMPLOYEE

George Hickman, 64, an employe of the West Fir Lumber company met death yesterday afternoon sometime between 4 and 5 o'clock when an 800 pound pulley fell upon him.

The deceased was born September 20, 1865, in Ohio, later moving to Wisconsin where he married Iva Bower.

The time for the funeral has not been announced but it will be held from the Walker-Poole chapel in Springfield and interment will be in Laurel Hill cemetery.
