

ORDERS FOR LUMBER EXCEED CUT 16 PER CENT

Seattle, Wash.—For the first eight weeks of 1929, orders for lumber exceeded production by 16 per cent and shipments were 9.9 per cent more than cutting, according to studies made by the West Coast Lumbermen's association on the reports of 143 major mills in the Douglas Fir region of Oregon and Washington. Mill stocks were six-tenths of one per cent under those reported as of January 1 for 143 identical mills.
