## NEW STREET SIGNS BEING PUT UP AT CITY INTERSECTIONS

The erection of street signs at the intersections of all of the local streets was commenced Tuesday under the supervision of the local civic club. Names and numbers of the street intersections over town requiring signs were procured from the city council. It is hoped to have the work completed by next week with all of the streets upon which people are living having the new signs.


The movement to erect street signs was commenced by the civic club last fall and money from various sources such as benefit entertainments and contributions has been procured. The signs have been made of wood gotten from the booth-Kelly company here and A. E. Woods local painter, is painting the signs and erecting them. It was the desire to have the signs to be a local product throughout and that was one of reasons wood signs were used in preference to metal.

The work has been started on A street rather than Main on account of the fact that iron straps must be used on Main street to fasten some of the signs to the iron posts.
