

**SNOW MELTING IN THE MOUNTAINS; RIVER HIGH**

Commencing with last Thursday when the Willamette river reached one of the highest stages of the year at 10.8 feet with serious indications of a flood, the river has throughout the week been almost full to the bank on either side. Thursday for some time the water began to creep up toward the highway at the low point near Mammy's Cabin, but since that time has remained safe along the bank's verge.

Reports from the mountains bring the information that the snows are rapidly melting and highway men feel that it will only be a matter of a short time when work can start on the fill for the west approach of the new Springfield bridge. Nothing has been done on the fill since completion of the east side fill because of flood danger.

**WENDLING BOY SCOUT TO RECEIVE MEDAL AT PRESENTATION APRIL 5**

Orlo Cummings, boy scout formerly of Wendling, who some time ago saved the life of 15 months old Mildred Domaschofsky of Wendling, will be presented at the 4-L hall in Wendling next Friday April 5 with the president's medal of the national safety council of the boy scouts. This will be the first award of this high honor to have ever been made in the northwest. Governor L. L. Patterson is to make the presentation. The medal is gold.

The baby's life, but for the aid of the boy scout would have been lost. The child was straying near a stream when she slipped and fell in; her sister who was near immediately summoned the child's mother who searched frantically for the child but could not locate her. Orlo Cummings was playing catch with another boy at the time not far from where the accident had happened and heard the mother's cries. He rushed upon the scene and found the prostrate baby in the water. By extreme cool headed application of resuscitation methods learned in the boy scouts young Cummings brought life back into the baby.

Besides the gold medal presentation to be made to Mr. Cummings there will be a meeting of the five 4-L safety councils of the Booth-Kelly operations at Wendling. W. P. Tyson of this city will be one of the speakers. Others on the program will be W. Smith of camp 30, G. McMormack of camp 40, and a representative of the council at camp 35, of which W. C. Richards is chairman, and W. Allen of Wendling.

First aid demonstrations will be put on by the Wendling boys club and George Aitken of Salem, field officer of the national safety council will give first aid demonstrations and show a two reel safety first picture.

Music will be furnished by the Wendling orchestra and Eagle scouts from Eugene in uniform will act as a guard of honor for Scout Orlo Cummings, who is now a resident of Corvallis, but will go to Wendling for the ceremony.
