PLEASANT HILL HOME DESTROYED BY FIRE

The house at Pleasant Hill owned by C. F. Hyde of Eugene and occupied by Ross Mathews and family was completely destroyed by fire last Sunday afternoon. The blaze started on the back porch from a piece of smoldering wood which had been taken from an over-heated stove in the house, and was beyond control before being discovered by Mr. Mathews. Mr. Mathews burned his left hand quite severely attempting to extinguish the fire.

Neighbors who gathered assisted Mr. Mathews in saving part of the contents of the house and the adjoining fruit house. A hole was chopped in the wall of the house to save the books and school papers of the Pleasant Hill school district, which Mr. Mathews is clerk. Mrs. Mathews and their son Albert were at Thurston at the time of the fire. Mr. Mathews carried an insurance of \$300 on the household goods.

The house was quite a landmark in the Pleasant Hill vicinity, being built more than forty years ago. At one time it was used as a hospital by Dr. Radabaugh.

The store in Eugene will be located in the Matlock building on East Broadway. The firm plans an extensive remodeling of the building occupied to extend over a period of years, but at present will make only a few alterations. The store will open for business in Eugene about May 15.

Kafoury's opened their store in Springfield fifteen months ago. Allen Kafoury states that his business and social relations with the people of Springfield have been pleasant, and that the store is moving to Eugene only because of the desire of the firm to specialize in ladies' wear, as at Salem and Portland. Mr. and Mrs. Kafoury will move to Eugene shortly after May 15.

BOY SCOUT TROOP IS FORMED AT WENDLING
