The following essay was the winner of first prize in division two of the safety contest sponsored recently by the Springfield 4 L and also of the grand prize of a fountain pen for the best essay submitted in the contest. It was written by Lena Stafford, a student in the Sixth A at the Bratwain school.

What Safety Means in the Home

To help make things safe in the home.

Pick up all pins and needles, as they cause the death of many babies.

Be on the lookout for sharp knives and scissors, and see that they are kept out of the reach of small children.

Keep medicines out of the reach of small children.

Do not leave anything on the stairs that may cause people to slip, trip or fall.

Keep rugs and carpets flat, so that people will not trip over them.

Keep the yard free from broken glass, rusty wires and projecting nails.

Do not leave combustible rubbish in cellars or attics or near buildings.

Do not leave oily rags lying about loose or in wooden receptacles.

Do not place paper, cotton, or other flimsy materials near lights.

Do not fail to fasten back any curtains which are near gas brackets.

Do not hang clothing near the stoves or stovepipes.

Do not leave matches where children can reach them.

Do not use any kind of matches except safety matches.

Do not use rubber connection for gas stoves.

Do not fill gas stoves or lamps when they are lighted or near other lights.

Do not kindle fires in stove with kerosene or gasoline.

Do not use benzine or gasoline for cleaning in a closed room or near a flame or a hot flatiron.

Do not put hot ashes into wooden receptacles.

Do not throw away lighted matches or cigars or cigarettes.

Do not light matches in closets or attics where clothing is hung.

Do not light matches in a room where gas is escaping.

CHANGE IN AUTOMOBILE LAWS NOW EFFECTIVE; 3 MONTHS LICENSES

New laws, affecting the operation of motor vehicles upon the public highways of the state of Oregon, became effective at midnight, June 3, and are now of interest to all motorists. Though the provisions for a reduction of license fees and an increase in the gasoline tax do not become effective until January 1, 1930, there are a number of enactments respecting motor vehicles which the 91st day after the adjournment of the legislature, ushered into being. How the rights and duties of the motoring public will be immediately affected by the numerous acts of the recent legislature is shown by a summary prepared by Hal E. Ross, Secretary of State.

Motor vehicles registered at any time during the period from June 4 to June 30, inclusive, will be licensed for 25 per cent off of the annual fee prescribed by the present law. This is provided for by an amendment contained in Chapter 296 which declares that "after the expiration of the first quarter of the registration year, a three-fourths' annual license fee shall be paid." In subsequent years this reduction will inure to vehicles registered on and after April 1, but in the present year it can only be applied to registrations made after the amendment becomes effective. The provisions for a 50 per cent reduction after the expiration of the first half of the registration year and a 75 per cent reduction after three-fourths of the year has expired are also embodied in the new law.

The owner or operator of a transient automobile registered in another state may no longer escape responsibility for accidents caused by him, by avoiding the service of papers in a suit in the courts in this state, as Chapter 359 provides that "the acceptance by a non-resident of the rights and privileges conferred by the laws of the state of Oregon to use the roads, highways and streets of this state, as evidenced by his operating a motor vehicle thereon, shall be deemed equivalent to an appointment by such non-resident of the secretary of the state of Oregon or his successor in office to be his true and lawful attorney, upon whom may be served all lawful summons and processes against him growing out of any accident, or liability collision in which said non-resident may be involved while operating a motor vehicle upon such highway." Service of summons in this manner will support a judgment upon which when transferred to the place of residence of the defendant, recovery may be had.

A motor vehicle owner or operator who transports another person as his guest without charge will be subject to a cause of action for damages by such guest if in an accident which is intentional on the part of such owner or operator, or which is the result of his gross negligence or intoxication or his reckless disregard of the rights of others, the guest sustains injury, death or loss. Thus Chapter 401 modifies the sweeping statutory rule sought to be established by the 1927 legislature, found to be unconstitutional by the Supreme Court and

pealed in 1929 declaring that the acceptance of a free ride in a motor vehicle should be presumed to be a waiver by the guest of any liability for accidental injury caused by the owner or operator of the vehicle.
