

Russian-Chinese Dispute Threatens Peace

school, made an attempt to scale the North Sister, the most treacherous of the three great mountains, Sunday, but failed after reaching the pinnacle that forms the very peak or 400 feet to the top would not be almost perpendicular, making it difficult to scale.

The party started the climb from Frog Camp about 2 o'clock Sunday morning, and reached the foot of the pinnacle by 8. The climb that far, Mr. Moffitt said, was not particularly difficult. The walking was rather

rough, although there was not much snow and ice. After spending two hours on the mountain, the men returned to Frog Camp, arriving shortly after 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

The air was quite clear Sunday on the mountain, and the party could see a great many other snow-capped mountain peaks. To the north they could see Mr. Jefferson, Mt. Hood and Mt. Adams. To the south they could see Diamond Peak and a number of other smaller mountains.
