#### Mr. and Mrs. Fred Hinson Celebrate 45 Years of Married Life; Are Feted

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Hinson of this city celebrated their 45th wedding anniversary on Monday of this week. It was then 46 years since Cora Sylvestor and Fred Hinson were married in Wisconsin. They were not satisfied to stay in that state and came here immediately after their marriage in 1884. They settled on a farm at Jasper, later moving to Cloverdale, and finally moving to Springfield in 1911, to be near a high school where they could educate their only son, Dell Frederick Hinson, who is married and living at Oswego where he is engaged in architectural work. He graduated from the Springfield high school and later finished at the University of Oregon.

#### Parents Still Living

Mrs. Hinson's parents are still living. They are making their home at Jasper. Her mother is now 80 and her father 81 years old. Mrs. Hinson is 62 years old and her husband boasts of 68 years. They are both still very energetic and active despite their years.

Mr. Hinson is employed by the city as night watchman. He has held that position now for the past ten years. Mrs. Hinson is active in the work of the Rebekah lodge here. She has held the post of financial secretary for the past seven years and has been a member since 1916, almost 14 years.

### HIGH BREAD SCORE GIVEN LOCAL BAKER

Signal success is being achieved in the baking of bread at the Springfield Bakery, according to a letter received recently by Fred G. Frese, the proprietor. He recently sent two loaves of bread to the Bakery Service bureau of one of the large flour mills for analysis, inspecting and grading. He received grading of 95 per cent on his loaf of white bread and a very commendable letter.

The following are quotations from the letter received by Mr. Frese. "We are very pleased to receive the two loaves of bread which you sent in last Saturday to be scored. We want to compliment you on your white loaf. The slow bake which you are giving this loaf brings out the flavor. However, it tends to give the crust a hardness which is undesirable. Nevertheless, the best loaves being marketed in the country are slow baked. The color of crumb is slightly yellow, but this is due no doubt to the flour which you are using, because your fermentation time is all right. We are pleased to give you a score of 95 on the loaf you sent in."

According to Mr. Frese the best score received by any baker a year ago was 93. He received a score of 92½ at that time. He is a strong advocate of slow baking for bread and contends that by baking a loaf of bread over 45 minutes all the food-stuff becomes digestible.

### STREET AND HIGHWAY IMPROVEMENT WORK NEARING COMPLETION

The roads leading into and out of Springfield are being rapidly improved and repaired by crews of workmen who are working both inside of the city limits and on the McKenzie highway, a state road. A crew has also gone over the road around by the old bridge and filled in all the small depressions on the macadamized surface.

Another crew is still working on the resurfacing of Main street from the bridge to the east end of pavement where the road will be straightened to do away with the present bad curve just east of the business section.

The state is pushing its work on the highway between Waverlyville and Springfield to completion. The road east of Springfield has been widened and graded. Trucks are now busy hauling gravel and sprinkling water on the loose dirt to make it settle faster. About one-half of the stretch is now surfaced and in fair shape to drive over. Another stretch is surfaced just east of town but it is very loose as yet and is not very good for motoring.

The east end of the new road which is being built to eliminate the curves just west of Waverlyville is now being brought into the old grade and is very rough and driving is difficult at present. The west end of this new section of the McKenzie is completed and travel can be directed over the new section as soon as the approach to the old road is passable. This stretch is loose and will not likely be graveled until it has settled over winter. Traffic, which is usually much lighter over the McKenzie highway in the winter months will probably be directed over the old route.

### WORK ON NEW BRIDGE PROGRESSES RAPIDLY

"It will probably be ten days before we are ready to pour the concrete for the slabs and superstructure of the new bridge," said Fred Lindsey of the firm of Hargreaves and Lindsey, which is doing the work on the approaches to the new bridge, when asked what time the bridge would be ready for use. He hastened to add that the work would be completed in time for the opening on the first of November, as is stipulated in the contract.

A. C. Mathews has his crew at work on the first and they will have most of the dirt placed and covered with gravel by the end of the week.

Carpenters are busy building the forms for the concrete work and the actual pouring will commence as soon as this work is completed.

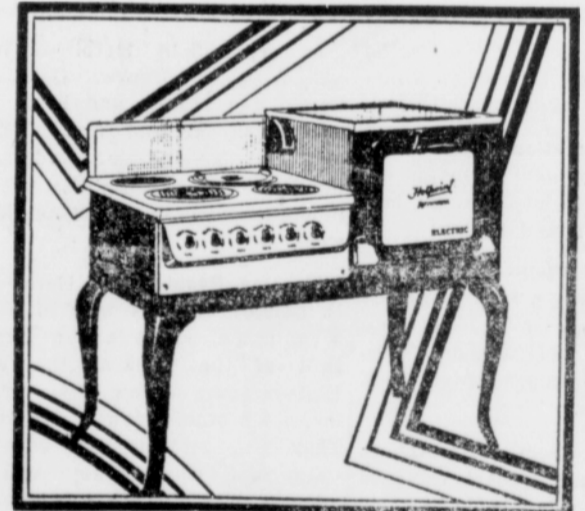
