Fandrum, Defendant: In the name of the State of Oregon: You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit within four weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons, and if you fail to so appear and answer, the plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief prayed for in the complaint, to-wit:

**CONFEDERATION INSTEAD OF CONSOLIDATION**

Dear Mr. Editor:

Since it is the finding of an expert, that it is not advisable for the cities of Eugene and Springfield to consummate a merger at this time but should wait for a more convenient season; when a greater spirit of harmony and feeling of common interest has been developed, to hasten this very desirable condition is certainly a worthy motive that should inspire every loyal citizen of both cities to do what he can for its promotion. As a long step in this direction by the people of Springfield, I am going to suggest that we change our town name to that of East Eugene; which will be our logical name in case of merger.

"East Eugene" in itself would advertise abroad the close relation of the community of Springfield to Eugene. It would also share in the enviable reputation of Eugene as a prosperous and growing city. It would make common property of the amount of population; as "Eugene's population" would, of course, be that of Eugene and East Eugene. The weight of the combined resources and payrolls could be effectively used in advertising and promotion. This mutual use of combined resources for a singleness of purpose—of building a greater city—would certainly go far to cultivate a feeling of good fellowship and common interest, which would gradually remove lines of demarcation of separate interests and cement the two cities into a united whole.

What we need now instead of a merger, is a confederation of interests of our two cities, if not in fact, in spirit at least.

This would still leave the administration of the municipal government in best hands—the local citizens—the respective communities. It would materially strengthen the useful forces and leave out many unpleasant features: such as municipal debts, taxation, representation, municipal utilities, removal of city offices and records four miles away (possibly outsiders filling local offices, etc., etc.)

It is evident that there is in making in this immediate vicinity a greater city, and if we have the vision and can look ahead far enough and have the breadth of heart and mind to reach out beyond our present narrow limits to help and support whatever might contribute to the wealth and prosperity of the greater city, we shall have a part in its building.

If Springfield is to be in the greater city it is going to be necessary for her to take some active

steps in that direction, and I believe that it would be a strategic move at this time for Springfield to take the name of "East Eugene." I believe it would make it much easier for the people of Eugene and Springfield to co-operate with a greater feeling of common interest.
