FAMED SCHOLARSHIP MAY BE AWARDED TO LOCAL YOUTH

An announcement was made at the University of Oregon early in the week that John Cox, of Springfield, was the only undergraduate of the fifteen who tried that was successful in receiving the recommendation of the examining board for appointment as Rhodes scholar. Three other boys were recommended, but they are all graduate students.

Mr. Cox will go to Portland in December and submit to another examination in competition with the representatives from other schools in Oregon. If Mr. Cox is one of the two selected there, it means that he will receive the free scholarship at Oxford University in England. The scholarship also provides for considerable travel in Europe and on the continent.

Cox is the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Cox of this city. He is now 22 years of age. He graduated from the Springfield high school in 1925 and is now a senior at the University. He remained out of college one year since graduating from the high school. He has two brothers, Bill and Kenneth, and three sisters, Ida, Ellen, and Bessie.

History has always interested Cox. He has done a great amount of reading during the evenings and the judges at the University complimented him on the extent of his general reading. They stated that this was one of the largest factors which led to his selection.
