LIBERAL TRAFFIC REGULATIONS HERE

Traffic regulation agitation keeps Eugene, our sister city, in turmoil, and parking limits work hardships on farmers and others who come to town and must spend a good deal of time moving their automobiles from one location to another in order that they may not be contributing to the city treasury via the police court. Eugene traffic is regulated to death, yet she has had probably more fatal motor accidents than any small city in Oregon.
