LIBERAL TRAFFIC REGULATIONS HERE

Traffic regulation agitation keeps Eugene, our sister city, in turmoil, and parking limits work hardships on farmers and others who come to town and must spend a good deal of time moving their automobiles from one location to another in order that they may not be contributing to the city treasury via the police court.

Springfield and other nearby cities profit by this agitation at the county seat—many county people have begun trading here that do not wish to stop in Eugene.

There are those who would regulate traffic in Springfield and bind us with a set of rules similar to those which have upset Eugene. What Springfield needs is as liberal traffic laws as possible, consistent with reasonable safety for motorists and pedestrians.

WORK ON MCKENZIE UNTIL IT IS FINISHED

The Lane County Chamber of Commerce meeting here last week went on record for the completion of the McKenzie highway as fast as funds are available. It also would have all sections of the highway up to state standards oiled this coming year.

There should be some work done on the McKenzie highway every year from now on until it is finished. In making up the budget this fall the Lane county court should budget sufficient to co-operate with the state on at least one section of the road.

FARM CROP OUTLOOK IMPROVED

With a supply 4.1 per cent below normal and the new federal farm board trying to stimulate the marketing of farm products, the prices this fall and winter should be above the average.

Prospective production of important crops compared to last year are corn, 82.9 per cent; wheat, 87.8; oats, 84.7; barley, 87.9; rye, 98.3; flax, 88.8; rice, 86.2; grain sorghums, 65.3; cotton, 102.8; tame hay, 108.2; beans, 109.6; apples, 75.7; pears, 85.0; grapes, 74.1; white potatoes, 74.3; sweet potatoes, 98.6; hogs, 96.6.

After reduction of rates to a lower base than Seattle and Los Angeles municipal plants, many users of commercial power in Portland have discovered that the old rates were still lower than the reduced rates, according to a check up made by the Oregon Voter.

MACDONALD—A PEACE PROPHET

Ramsay MacDonald's visit to the United States is important for many reasons—but perhaps most important because he comes as a messenger of peace, with the intention of hastening the world-wide peace movement.

We have made many sacrifices for war, says MacDonald—why not make some sacrifices for peace? These words are noble and beautiful.

This apostle of peace—this good-will messenger from Great Britain—comes not as a prince or king to these shores, but as simple Ramsay MacDonald, son of a Scottish farm laborer.

PREVENT FIRES!

Annual Fire Prevention Week, which has just closed, was in a way a commemoration of the great Chicago fire, for it was on October 8, 1871 that Mrs. O'Leary's cow kicked over a lantern and started a conflagration which raged two days and nights, killing 250 persons and destroying \$195,000,000 worth of property.

Since 1926, those sponsoring Fire Prevention Week disclose, there have been diminishing fire losses. Nevertheless, in the last year for which statistics are available, 1926, 10,000 persons were killed and property worth nearly half a million was destroyed by fires in the United States.

Most of these fires were preventable. It is said ninety per cent of the deaths and destruction were avoidable. It is up to every citizen to keep in mind always the necessity for constant watchfulness and care to prevent fires.

Southern Oregon shipped 3,500 cars of pears this fall and got real money for them.

This should be a lesson to Lane county that it pays to specialize in some crop you can grow well. Shot gun methods in farming does not work out so well in this age when quality products are demanded. It's all right to diversify, but a county without a leader or two cannot expect to reach the top of the agricultural ladder.

Lane County, regarded in many ways as the second county in Oregon, is seventh in manufacturing. Lane county works 3,369 people in manufacturing plants and turns out products valued at \$11,709,473, according to the census bureau.

WOMEN GROW WEALTHIER

According to Lawrence Stern and Company, investment bankers of New York and Chicago, 41 per cent of the individual wealth of the United States is controlled by women. This firm also reported that women are the beneficiaries of 80 per cent of the \$95,000,000,000 of life insurance policies now in force.

The figures are big enough to invite general consideration apart from their usefulness in marking the tremendous economic progress of women in this country. Industry and finance are more and more looking to women for needed capital, as the increase of women shareholders convincingly shows.—Nation's Business.
