

# MANY ACCIDENTS DURING WEEK-END

### W. C. McLagan Seriously Injured Near Dallas, Mrs. Rowe Thrown From Car; Window in Plumbing Shop Broken, Several Other Cars Smashed.

W. C. McLagan, who was seriously injured in an automobile crash last Saturday night near Dallas is recovering, according to the latest reports obtainable. He suffered a relapse on Tuesday, but is thought to be safely on the road to recovery now. The accident was caused when he turned out to avoid a collision with another machine and in doing so he drove off the roadway and hit a nearby tree. His nose was badly lacerated on both sides of his face and he suffered bad bruises to his legs and chest when the impact of the crash threw his body against the steering wheel.

Mrs. McLagan left Springfield early Sunday morning to be with her husband at Dallas.

Jay Martin of Horton, Oregon, and two companions from Junction City overturned near Thurston at 8:00 o'clock Sunday morning and completely wrecked the new Ford coupe which he was driving. No one was injured, although they all received bad bruises and were badly shaken up. They were thrown from the machine and it rolled over several times until it went through a fence and landed in a field along the road. First news of the accident was received here about eight-thirty when the trio walked into town and asked that a wrecker go out for the wrecked car.

Mrs. Nate Rowe suffered from a shock and minor injuries received early Sunday morning when she was thrown from the running board of the Rowe car while preparing to alight on the sidewalk. Just as Mrs. Rowe stepped on the running board the car was bumped from the rear by another machine driven by Fred Gimpi of Eugene, and she fell to the pavement, bumping the back of her head. Doctors hurriedly summoned at first reported that she may have received concussion of the brain, but a short while later it was decided that the injuries were not serious. No serious damage was done to either of the cars.

The next accident in Springfield occurred at the corner of Seventh and Main streets about eight o'clock Sunday evening, when the large car of O. W. Morrow, Kellog, Idaho, was hit by another car being driven by Ellis Pickens of McElynn, Oregon. Pickens, according to eye witnesses, cut the corner very short and hit the front end of the Morrow car, which was parked at the proper side of the street. The bumper of the Morrow car was bent, and the front wheel and fender on the Pickens' car were broken. Pickens had two companions with him at the time of the accident.

The plate glass window in the W. N. Long plumbing store on Main street was demolished about seven o'clock Monday evening, when a local woman drove an automobile up on the sidewalk into the window, breaking it and scattering bits of broken glass fifteen feet back on the inside of the store. The woman had just picked up a battery at the garage next door and had backed her car out on the street. It seems that the front wheels of the car were locked against the curb and she was unable to straighten them before she started forward.

Other cars were reported to have been overturned Saturday and Sunday evenings in front of the Rose Gray tea room and on the highway between Eugene and Coburg, but no details could be secured concerning these.

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
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
