It was proposed that the legion posts make a survey of the facilities available in their respective communities so as to place themselves in a position of greater usefulness when emergency cases arise. It was argued that it would be very beneficial to know just where to turn whenever any aid is needed regardless of the type or the circumstances.

BUDGET IS \$51,000

Committee Meets on Monday Night and Makes Estimate of Expenses Needed to Operate Schools in District During Coming Year.

The taxes for school district 19 will be about \$500 less this year than last if the voters approve of the budget which the school budget committee drew up for the next year at a meeting held Monday evening. The budget this year has been set at \$51,000.00 The total estimated receipts are given as \$19,650.00, leaving \$31,350.00 to be raised by the district tax levy.

A meeting of all legal voters in the district has been called for November 29, at which time any objections to or approval of the budget as drawn by the committee will be neard.

The total bonded indebtedness of the district is now \$71,000.00. There edness for warrants issued and endorsed "not paid for lack of funds." edness at \$79.962.69.

Forty-one thousand and three hundred dollars of the budget will be used for salaries and actual operating expenses. The remaining nine thousand seven hundred dollars will be used to pay on the interest and
