### FOX FARM EXPANDING; NEW PENS BEING BUILT

An idea of the progress which is being made in the raising of silver foxes in the McKenzie mountains can be gained from the recent announcement that 77 new pens will be built soon at the McKenzie fox farm, about sixty miles east of Springfield. The company started business in 1925 with two old foxes and four young ones. From this stock the farm has increased until now they have 192 foxes, which are valued at \$250,000. Ten foxes were taken to the Pacific International Livestock Exposition at Portland last month, and they returned with several blue ribbons.

Sixty-one puppies have passed the requirements for registration this year. In order to pass this examination it is necessary to be very careful of the quality and cleanliness of the food given to the foxes.
