SPRINGFIELD FIRE TOTAL GIVEN IN ANNUAL REPORT

Springfield had a very light fire year in 1929, according to the annual report of Jess Smitsen, fire chief. Fifty-one alarms were turned in to the fire department, to make runs for that many fires. The property threatened by fire had a valuation of \$5,771.00. The actual loss by fire is estimated at \$3,425.00. The fire truck traveled 601 blocks in answering the local calls and used 334 gallons of chemicals.

Eight out of town calls were answered by the truck. Three of them were to West Springfield, one to the Green Lantern when it was destroyed this summer, one to Goshen, and one to the Cloverleaf dairy.

The most damaging fires of the entire year was the blaze which destroyed the Senseney blacksmith shop and the fire which was discovered in the sawdust bin at the planing mill here.

OREGON STATE NEWS OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Assembled for information of Our Readers.

Automobile sales were 22 per cent greater in Oregon in 1929 than 1928. Portland bank clearings for 1929 increased more than \$90,000,000 over 1928.

Income tax collections in Oregon increased \$400,000 last year over the preceding 12 months. Rhododendrons are blooming at Marshfield in some localities, while buttercups and violets are common in parts of Curry county.

Two employees of the General Construction company employed on the Owyhee dam were killed when a skip upset a car on the track. Ludvik Matocha, 1-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Matocha, Willamina, was scalded to death when he fell into a tub of boiling water.

Linn county's consolidated tax levy for 1930 will be 5 mills less than 1929. This reduction is accomplished by a slight cut in property valuations. Farmers living along the Lane-Benton county boundary are planning to work out a plan for improving the drainage of surface waters from their fields.

James and Mrs. Kamlin lost their home on Smith river, western Douglas county, when a slide demolished the residence during their absence in Reedsport.

The city council of Medford will support Mrs. H. L. Barto, recently appointed police matron to supervise dances in the city. The ordinance has long been inoperative.

The beacon light for the air mail service installed on Creswell butte initiated its first service a short time ago, spreading a circular spotlight over the entire valley.

A pine tree 467 years old, according to rings, that stood in the city limits of Bend, has been cut down and converted into cordwood for the Bend fire hall and city offices.

D. J. Buckner, 55, watchman at the mill at West Port, east of Astoria, was killed when he fell from a ladder as he was boarding a vessel, which was tied up at the mill dock.

Farmers in the Medford district are turning their cattle on pastures of winter bluegrass, the newly developed forage crop in that section. Recent rains have given it excellent growth.

Fire loss in Eugene during 1929 was \$52,930, according to the annual report of W. E. Nushbaum, fire chief, submitted recently. A total of \$45,075 insurance was carried. It was stated.

Snowdrifts three and four feet deep in the big cut near the summit of the McKenzie pass and a general blanket of snow 24 to 30 inches in depth has blocked the pass road for the winter.

Scaling a ladder to rescue one of his cats which had been chased to the roof of an adjoining building by a dog, J. B. Messick, mayor of Baker, fell 14 feet and suffered a sprained ankle.

Mr. and Mrs. John J. Dooley, said to be the oldest couple in eastern Oregon and parents of the first white child born in Baker county, have celebrated their 68th wedding anniversary.

Extensive improvement of central Oregon's mountain resorts, including new construction on the old William Brock site on the southwest shore of Odell lake, is planned for the coming year.

The Marshfield chamber of commerce has asked the support of other Coos county communities in securing \$25,000 from the county funds for a shorter road to Empire and to the beaches.

Approximately \$1,359,400 was expended in new building in Salem during the year 1929, according to a report of the city building inspector.

Although a few days late, the county court recently gave taxpayers of Umatilla county the best Christmas present of all. When it made the annual levy it was 12.2 mills, the lowest in ten years.

An agreement was reached among cantaloupe growers of the Umpqua valley recently which will result in all melons from that district being marketed under one label and through one organization.

Four hundred thousand cases of fruit and vegetables were canned at the plant of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association during 1929, according to J. O. Holt, manager. This is a record for the plant.

Inheritance tax receipts in Oregon for the year ending December 31, 1929, exceeded \$1,000,000, or approximately \$300,000 more than in 1928, according to a report prepared by T. B. Kay, state treasurer.

Chicken Creek siphon, one of the big tasks of the Vale irrigation project construction, is being completed. It is 450 feet long and 13 feet in diameter. Contractors will have the system ready for use before spring.

The Marion county court will ask the state highway commission to cooperate in the survey of the proposed north Santiam road over the mountain to Sistris, according to an announcement made in Salem recently.

Harvesting the crop of late cabbage in the Grand island district is now in progress and it is being hauled by truck to market in nearby cities and towns in the Willamette valley. A great deal is also used locally for sauerkraut.

Construction of an elevator at Myrick station near Pendleton was seen as a possibility after a meeting of grain growers of that section. Formation of a grain growers' corporation to take advantage of the federal farm board loans was discussed.

Purchase of the Central Oregon bank by the Lumbermens National bank, both of Bend, was announced by C. L. Isted, president of the Lumbermens, and G. S. Hinsdale, president of the Pacific Bancorporation, owner of the Central Oregon.

Cupid had a good year in Multnomah county in 1929. There were 192 more marriage licenses issued than during the previous year, the total for 1929 being 2536, and for 1928, 2344. Divorces filed were fewer by 23 in 1929 than for the previous year.

Albany's postoffice was restored to first-class status by a tremendous volume of business during December, Postmaster Torbet announced. The Albany office was rated as first class in 1928, but the following year business dropped below the required \$40,000 mark.

The new law enacted by the 1929 legislature increasing the gasoline tax in Oregon from 3 to 4 cents a gallon became effective January 1. The additional 1 cent tax will raise approximately \$1,750,000 annually, according to officials. The yield from the 4-cent tax was estimated around \$7,000,000.

A watermelon from a Cottage Grove garden for Christmas is the "Believe It or Not" record for that section of the fruitful Willamette. The melon was served on the table of J. M. Davidson, who picked it just before the recent heavy rains and put it away to save for the Christmas feast.

A complete test for tuberculosis and contagious abortion in progress in Hood River county may result in that area being the first in Oregon and possibly in the northwest to have 100 per cent of its dairy cattle tested, according to report by County Agent A. L. Marble to the state agent leader at Corvallis.

Taxpayers of Nehalem grade school district voted 29 to 3 in favor of the construction of a modern natorium upon the school grounds at an approximate cost of \$30,000. If plans are carried out, the building, which will measure about 50 by 90 feet, will not only house an up-to-date natorium but will provide for four classrooms as well.

Portland's export business for the year ending December 31, attained a valuation of \$53,161,663, registering a gain over 1928, when the total offshore shipments were valued at \$50,322,276. General cargo exports had a value of \$14,586,862, whereas \$11,384,004 represented the value in 1928, while the 1927 business was cleared at \$10,199,948, and valuations were \$12,105,171 in 1926.

Moses J. Reeves, 104, died recently in Salt Lake City. He had lived in Baker until about two years ago. He attracted considerable attention July 4, 1928, by dancing a jig at the celebration in Baker. He was then 101 years old.

Through cooperative action of seven Lane county seed dealers, orders for 8500 pounds of alfalfa seed are being placed in Idaho to be distributed among Lane county alfalfa growers. The highest grade of seed is being purchased.
