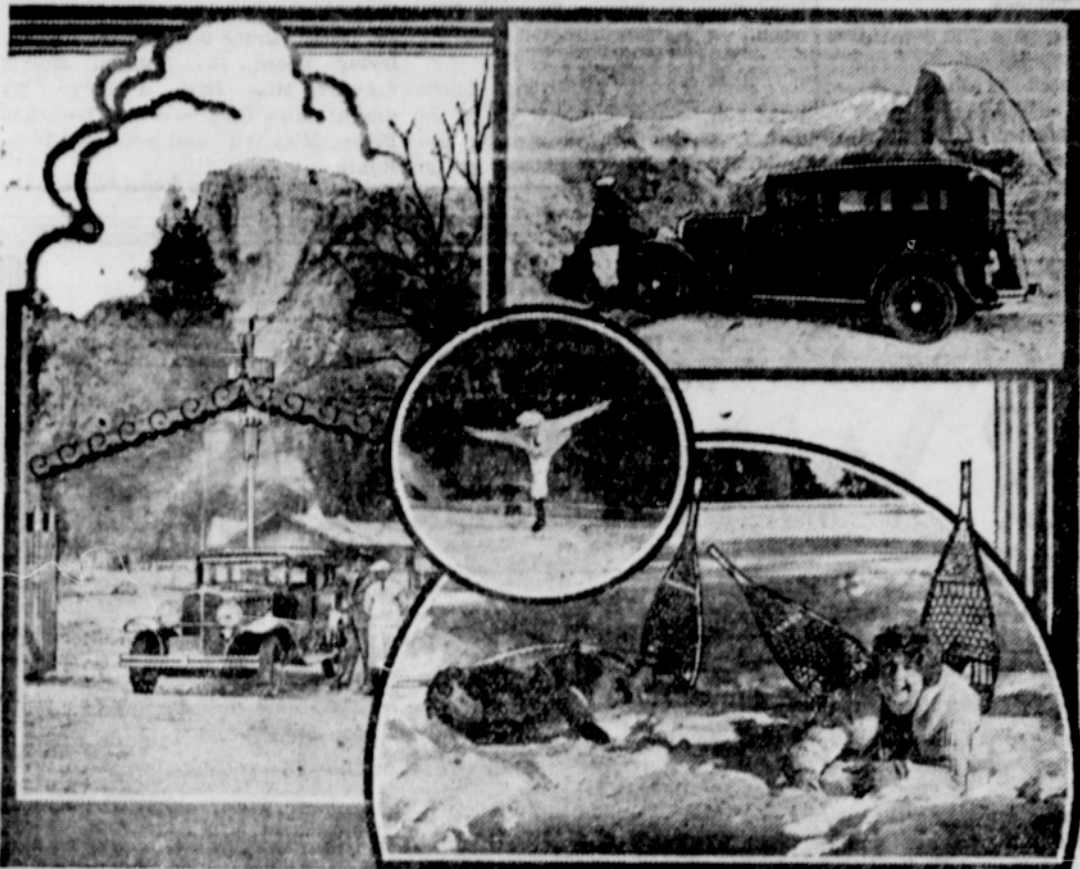


New V-Type 8-Cylinder Car Proves Claims
