**INTEREST PAYMENTS ON SCHOOL BONDS IS SECOND FOR COUNTY**

School district number 19 which consists of the three Springfield schools ranks second among the eleven districts in Lane county in the amount of outstanding bond issues and second in the amount of interest to be paid on these bonds according to a report issued last week by Grace Schiska, Lane county treasurer.

The worst feature of the Springfield school financial status is that none of the outstanding bond issues are being retired this year. There is only one other district, number 163, not making any payments this year on the outstanding indebtedness according to the statement.

School district No. 19 has bonds now outstanding to the extent of \$71,000. The only other district in the county with a larger debt is the Eugene schools in district number 4. They owe \$432,000 in bonds. The interest on the bonds this year will cost Springfield taxpayers \$3,795.00. Eugene will have to pay \$20,390.00 in interest this year.

Districts and amounts of outstanding bonds follow: No. 4, \$432,000; No. 19, \$71,000; No. 43, \$49,150; No. 45, \$50,000; No. 69, \$36,000; No. 76, \$36,000; No. 79, \$9,500; No. 133, \$4,500; No. 163, \$20,000; union high school No. 8, \$18,000; No. 185, \$11,000.

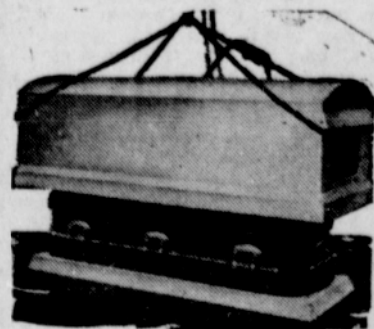
